

Parents and Godparents should attend the baptism class on the first Tuesday of the month at 6:30 pm in the Parish Hall classrooms. Adults are baptized at the Easter Vigil after completing the stages of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA).




# LV Diocesan Conference September 6-7 at Texas Station

## Welcome the Stranger

We have become accustomed to seeing pictures in the media and stories on the news about immigrants from Latin America and refugees from Syria fleeing violence and destruction in their own countries, trying to make their way to a safe place. We have also seen the reactions of people who want to keep them away from their countries, who fail to welcome the stranger and the helpless children. Have we forgotten Jesus' call to comfort the homeless and the stranger? "They shall bring all your brothers and sisters from all the nations . . . to Jerusalem, my holy mountain, says the LORD."

In the three readings for this day, we are told that we are to welcome these strangers, to welcome the discipline of the Lord, which leads to peace, and to "strive to enter through the narrow gate" into the glory of God's own homeland, the reign of God.

Saint of the Week

Blessed Chiara "Luce" Badano

October 29, 1971 -October 7, 1990

Beatified by Pope Benedict XVI in 2010

Feast Day - October 29

Chiara "Luce" Bandano was born in 1971, an only child to parents who had waited long for her arrival. As a child, she was bright, friendly, athletic, and had many friends. At age 9, she joined the Focolare movement and was very inspired by this spirituality. She was struck with cancer at age 17, but never lost her bright spirit. After a two-year battle with the disease, she entered eternal rest on October 7, 1990. Her last words were a message of hope: "Be happy, because I am!" She was beatified by Pope Benedict XVI in 2010.

"I think you all know that on Saturday, September 25th, in Rome, an Italian girl named Chiara, Chiara Badano, was beatified. I invite you to get to know her: her life was short, but it's a wonderful message. Chiara was born in 1971 and died in 1990, because of an incurable illness. Nineteen years full of life, of love, of faith. Two years, the last ones, also filled with pain and suffering, but always in love and light, a light that shone around her, and that came from within: from her heart filled with God! How can this be? How can a girl of 17, 18 years live a suffering like this, without any kind of human hope, spreading love, serenity, peace, faith? Obviously, this is a grace from God, but this grace was also prepared and accompanied by human collaboration: the collaboration of Chiara herself, certainly, but also of her parents and her friends."— Pope Benedict XVI, Palermo, October 2010

## **Choir News**

Attention singers! Our choir season begins again in September and we are looking for anyone who enjoys singing and wants to be involved with a vibrant and close knit community. We have three choirs that sing at different Masses, so there is a group for virtually anyone who wants to be involved.

Our **Celestial Voices Choir** is open to children from 3<sup>rd</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> grade. They practice on Wednesdays from 3:45 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. and sing every Sunday at the 10:00 a.m. Mass.

The **Young Adult Choir** rehearses on Wednesdays as well from 5:15 p.m. to 6:45 p.m. This group is open to anyone from 9<sup>th</sup> grade through college age, and they sing at the 4:00 p.m. Mass each Sunday.

Finally, our **Adult Choir** practices on Thursdays from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Anyone from college age and up can join this ensemble. The Adult Choir sings Sundays at the noon Mass.

All rehearsals begin the first week of September – Sept. 4<sup>th</sup> for Celestial Voices and Young Adults, and September 5<sup>th</sup> for Adults. There is no pre-registration necessary, just show up to the first rehearsal and we will get you enrolled. # Children's Faith Formation (age 3 – grade 8)

We offer formation classes for children preparing for First Eucharist, Baptism (older than age 7), Continuing Formation (after receiving the sacraments), and the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Program for children ages 3 to 5 (entering kindergarten).

# The 2019-2020 season starts the week of September 17.

- Classes: Tuesdays and Thursdays
- Times:4:30 p.m. to 5:40 p.m.<br/>and 6:00 p.m. to 7:10 p.m.

## **Requirements:**

- Parents or guardians are registered members of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Parish or a Catholic Parish in the Las Vegas Diocese. Regular attendance at Sunday Liturgy is part of the formation process.
- Registration fee is \$150.00 per child. No child will be turned away due to financial difficulty.
- Families must provide a Birth and Baptism Certificate and deposit at the time of registration. Sacrament preparation at SEAS is a family preparation process that requires the participation of the child and the parent throughout the formation years.

#### Sacraments:

#### **Rite of Christian Initiation for Children (RCIC)**

This is a two-year process for children who were not baptized as infants, who have attained the age of reason (7 years), are of catechetical age, and who will participate in the Rite of Christian Initiation at the Easter Vigil in their second year of preparation.

#### **First Eucharist Initiation:**

The two-year preparation process to celebrate First Eucharist teaches children about the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist. The child and the parent will participate in retreats in their second year.

#### **Continuing Formation:**

Children in 3rd grade and higher who are baptized and have received First Eucharist will continue their formation in age appropriate classes. It is the practice of our faith that formation is ongoing and is a life-long journey.

#### Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS):

This is a hands-on, interactive working environment where children are guided toward a greater understanding of God's love in their life. They encounter Jesus the Good Shepherd, who loves them, cares for them and knows them by name. Children are most sensitive to a relationship with God between the ages of 3-6. For this reason, we provide formal faith formation for young children.

## Catechists and Assistants Needed For Faith Formation

Our parish Faith Formation Program relies on the dedicated and generous service of volunteers who serve as parish catechists and assistants. If you would like to serve our SEAS parish community by helping to hand-on the Catholic faith to children in grades kindergarten through high school, become a volunteer catechist or assistant today!

The ministry of catechist is one of the oldest ministries of the Church. A "catechist" is one who teaches the principles of Christian dogma, discipline, and ethics to prepare people for participation in Christian life. The word "catechesis" means to echo or to resound, an appropriate meaning for what a catechist does in passing of the faith tradition to the children of our parish.

To be a catechist, you must:

- •be a practicing Catholic
- •be in communion with the Church
- complete a ministry application
- be fingerprinted and attend the Protecting God's Children Program
- continue your own faith formation

## Treasures From Our Tradition

When Pope Pius XII died in 1958, there was the usual buzz of speculation about likely successors. Cardinal Agajanian, Patriarch of the Armenians, was highly thought of as a likely choice. This took many Catholics by surprise, since he had never celebrated the same liturgy as Pope Pius, but followed ancient Armenian customs according to the Eastern Church, which veils the Eucharisic liturgy from sight by a series of curtains, and in which the priest kneels while the people stand for Communion.

In the years that followed, the Second Vatican Council would affirm the dignity and independence of the Eastern Churches, in complete union with Rome, yet different in patterns of life and worship. We have the same faith, the same sacraments, and the same pope. Yet, everywhere in the world our separate Churches are combined into families held together by the ministry of bishops. All of this serves as warning: If you ever say, "But we've always done it this way," you are on very thin ice indeed!

# **KILLING THE** PAIN, NOT THE PATIENT: PALLIATIVE CARE VS. ASSISTED SUICIDE

Assisted suicide is in the news and tient must assess the good they on lawmakers' agendas. Supporters call it "aid in dying" and claim it is just another option for ending intolerable pain as part of end-oflife care. But assisted suicide is radically different from end-of-life care and the practice of palliative care, the healing art of relieving pain and other distressing symptoms for patients who are seriously ill. In fact, these two agendas are at war with each other.

#### **Different Drugs, Different Results**

When properly prescribed for the pain of serious illness, powerful pain medications like morphine and other opioids are safe and effective. Patients can have their pain well-controlled without risk to life, and generally stay alert as well.

Assisted suicide is very different. Where it has been legalized, doctors can prescribe a lethal overdose of pills to patients whom they think will die within six months, so they can kill themselves. The patient then intentionally swallows a massive overdose of barbiturates to cause unconsciousness and death.

#### The Importance of Intent

Besides having opposite results, these two approaches express different intentions.

While pain medication is generally safe under medical supervision it may have side-effects. For example, barbiturates may be used in rare instances to sedate an agitated patient in the final stage of dying if other pain control methods are inadequate, though this poses some risk of shortening life.

In such cases, the doctor and pa-

intend and proceed only if this good outweighs the unintended adverse effects. As risk cannot always be eliminated, modern medicine would be impossible without this "principle of double effect." The key is that no one involved intends the bad effects, especially the bad effect of killing the patient.

Assisted suicide, by contrast, directly intends the patient's death, which is never morally permissible. The doctor prescribes an intentionally lethal overdose, with instructions on how to use the pills to cause death. (Interestingly, there is no record that any patient accidentally surviving the overdose has ever tried it again.<sup>1</sup>)

Medical organizations like the American Medical Association and the American College of Physicians oppose doctor-assisted suicide, in part because it destroys this essential distinction between intended and unintended effects of treatment. Patients need to be able to trust their doctors to always care for their lives and never deliberately cause death.

#### Eliminate the Problem, Not the Patient

Palliative care also addresses symptoms beyond physical pain, in ways that go beyond medication. Patients facing serious illness may feel hopeless and depressed, as though their lives have lost meaning. Addressing psychological, emotional, and spiritual problems is essential to palliative care. Assisted suicide alleviates none of these problems, but gives in to them. Consider that about half of patients who had requested assisted suicide under the Oregon law in

its first three years changed their minds when the doctor provided palliative care.<sup>2</sup>

Yet, in Oregon, almost none of the patients receiving lethal drugs are evaluated to assess whether their wish for death arises from treatable depression — and over half say they requested the drugs partly because they feel they are becoming a "burden" on others.<sup>3</sup> Offering assisted suicide can only confirm and strengthen that feeling. It ignores the underlying problems, instead abandoning and eliminating the patient who has the problems.

Assisted Suicide Undermines Palliative Care

Assisted suicide is detrimental not only for individual patients, but also for patient care on a large scale. In countries like the Netherlands, where assisted suicide has been accepted for many years, progress in palliative care has stagnated.<sup>4</sup> In Oregon, legalization was followed by an increase in severe untreated pain among terminally ill patients. During a period when 1,832 hospices opened in other states, only five opened in Oregon. In other states legalizing assisted suicide, use of hospice care has fallen below the national average.<sup>5</sup> By contrast, when states pass new laws forbidding assisted suicide, while affirming that doctors may use drugs like morphine for effective pain control, use of these medications has increased — indicating progress in pain management practices.<sup>6</sup>

The reason is obvious. Optimum palliative care requires years of training and experience, as well as a commitment to the patient as someone with inherent dignity; who deserves excellent care. Assisted suicide avoids the need for this hard work and erodes this commitment. It provides a "quick and easy," as well as cheap answer to terminal illness. Once death is accepted as a solution, why bother to devote resources to more expensive medical progress?

Assisted suicide does not enhance medicine. As noted by a doctor specializing in palliative and hospice care in the Netherlands, killing "becomes a substitute for learning how to relieve the suffering of dying patients."<sup>7</sup>

#### **True Love and Mercy**

Do we see people as the problem, such that our

responsibility begins and ends with helping patients kill themselves? Or, do we see seriously ill patients as fellow human beings who deserve our love and solutions for their problems? Will we succumb to the "false mercy" of assisted suicide, or will we endorse what Pope St. John Paul II called "the way of love and true mercy"?<sup>8</sup> Will we dedicate ourselves to providing genuinely compassionate care, as a society and for our own loves ones? Our answer today determines the care available now and for years to come.

# Stewardship: Source of Deepening Spirituality

Excerpted from an article by Daniel Conway, recipient of a 2019 award from the Catholic Press Association

God never stops giving! If we truly seek a deeper relationship with God, our response is to praise God for this great treasure and to demonstrate our gratitude by taking care of, and sharing, God's wonderful gifts every day.

I began thinking about stewardship in the early 1990s and had the great privilege of learning about stewardship from the late Seattle Archbishop Thomas J. Murphy, who at that time was chairman of the United States bishops' ad hoc committee on stewardship and the principal architect of the bishops' pastoral letter, Stewardship: A Disciple's Response.

Stewardship describes a Christian steward as "one who receives God's gifts gratefully, cherishes and tends them in a responsible and accountable manner, and returns them with increase to the Lord" (SDR, p. 9). Because God never stops giving, a Christian steward is constantly being invited, and challenged, to receive, cherish, share and return-with-increase the fruits of God's abundant generosity. This is why stewardship is a lifelong responsibility. As long as God keeps giving, we are called to be open and responsive to all his gifts, both spiritual and material.

Stewardship is a source of deepening spirituality because it challenges us to let go of any false notions that we are somehow in control of our lives, our skills and our talents, or our material possessions. We are not the authors of our own existence. We are not the owners of our spiritual and material gifts. We are stewards (caretakers or custodians) of what belongs exclusively and entirely to God.

God has given us the gift of life and the gift of intelligence. We are responsible for taking care of ourselves and developing our minds and growing in wisdom and understanding. We have been given the skills and abilities that allow us to earn a living, care for those we love, and contribute to the common good by our work and by our service to others in the Church and in our community. These gifts of time and talent make it possible for us to acquire the material possessions that we need and enjoy. All God's gifts are good. They are meant to be used responsibly and shared generously with others.

Stewardship helps us develop what Archbishop Murphy called a lifestyle of sharing. When we respond to God's goodness by growing in gratitude, responsibility and generosity, we can experience the difference stewardship makes in our daily lives. As the archbishop said, stewardship invites us to reflect on what is most basic and fundamental in our lives—and to respond from the heart. Stewardship is not a program. It is a way of life.

Stewardship helps us recognize that the ordinary experiences of daily living are gifts from God to be cherished and shared with others. Since God never stops giving, our opportunities to respond from the heart are truly endless. That's why Archbishop Murphy believed that stewardship is a way of life and a life-long source of grace and deepening spirituality.

# A Campaign for Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton

Dear Parishioners,

Has the air conditioner ever gone out at your house? It's a big headache, and the repairs are pricey. The severe Las Vegas heat takes a toll on air conditioners, and the ones that cool our parish buildings are no exception.

The parish wants to avoid problems with our air conditioners, which is why they're a priority in our **HONORING** *our* **PAST EMBRACING** *our* **FUTURE Capital Campaign.** So far, we've received \$1,816,373 in pledges to the campaign.

Our campus has a total of 58 air conditioning units. Of that total, 38 units will need to be replaced in the near future — 23 in the school, 2 in the church, and 13 in the Parish Hall. Funds from the campaign will be used to replace, only as needed, those 38 units. Doing so will avoid breakdowns and costly repairs.

The overall aim of our campaign is to sustain our church and school, address deferred maintenance, and enhance our worship space. The campaign, which has a \$4.5 million goal, is focused on projects you identified in the planning study that led to this vital effort.

Our campaign is running strong, but we still have a long way to go to reach our goal. Everyone must participate for it to become a success.

I ask that if you have not yet had an opportunity to make a gift to the campaign that you please do so. Your gift, along with those from your fellow parishioners, will help our parish continue to thrive and to minister to God's people.

#### **Revisiting Your Capital Campaign Questions**

# What is the financial relationship between the parish and our school?

Our church and school have separate operating budgets and separate accounts, but because the Catholic education we provide through our school is a ministry of our parish (parochial school) we subsidize it.

# Why is our school an important ministry that we should support—whether we have a connection to the school or not?

Other than the sacramental liturgies, our 2nd largest ministry is Catholic education. Out of all the titles Jesus could have taken while performing his public ministry, "rabbi" or "teacher" was the one he took. The Church has carried on this ministry of teaching through the Catholic education provided in parochial or parish schools. We continue that tradition of offering a Catholic education here at our parish.

In the United States, the first Catholic school was started by our patroness, Elizabeth Ann Seton. It was a free Catholic school for girls in Emmittsburg, Maryland. That first school began our present-day Catholic school system. Education based in the teachings of Jesus Christ help form good, faith-based citizens who not only benefit our parish, but our society as a whole.

#### How can this capital campaign unite our parish?

As Christians, we are all called to be members of the body of Christ and our parish family is part of Christ's body here at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton. 
