A Letter from Our Pastor

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

PRAYER AND PRIVACY

In our gathering space we've had a beautiful tradition of writing down our prayer intentions in our parish **Book of Prayers**. Some may ask, however, "Why do I need to tell God what God already knows?" After all, in Matthew 6:8 Jesus clearly says, "Your Father knows what you need before you ask him."

Well, it's true that we don't need to inform God of our needs. God knows it all even before we do! But, expressing our needs to God is a way that we affirm our relationship with God. We trust that God hears all our prayers and answers them all in God's own way and in God's own time. Expressing our intentions in a written form is a simple and profound way to express them concretely and then let go and trust in God's will. We pray in the Lord's Prayer, "thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven."

With our present Book of Prayers, concerns have been raised about privacy issues. In this day and age, privacy is a very important and personal matter. Some written intentions in our Book of Prayers have contained private information about a person's medical condition or other personal information that should not be shared with the public. Unfortunately, in some instances, others have read these intentions and then freely shared information that should have remained private. Privacy, especially with prayer, was important to Jesus as well. In Matthew 6:6 Jesus says, *"When you pray, go to your inner room, close the door, and pray to your Father in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will repay you."*

Therefore, our new way of continuing to express our prayer intentions will be by writing them on special forms and placing them in our new parish **Chest of Prayers** in the same location. In this way we can still concretely express our intentions while also respecting everyone's privacy as well. We will pray for the intentions in our parish Chest of Prayers at Mass. In this way, intentions are lifted up to God, privacy is respected and it's a winwin situation for all.

PRAYER LIST OF THE SICK IN THE BULLETIN

On a similar note, and due to privacy issues and concerns, we will no longer be publishing names in the bulletin of those who are in need of prayer. There have been instances when someone, out of the goodness of their heart, has submitted someone else's name for inclusion on this Prayer List without that person's permission. There is no way for us to concretely know who would or would not want their name listed in the bulletin.

So, you may ask: "How do I know who to pray for from our parish?" Well, obviously we have no need to tell God who needs prayer (see the first paragraph). And, I can assure you, there are many more people from our parish who need prayer but are not included on this list. Therefore, please allow me, if you will, to share with you how I include everyone in my own personal prayer. It goes like this:

"Lord, I pray for all those who have asked for my prayers, those I have promised to pray for, those who are in most need of my prayers, and those who have no one to pray for them."

That just about takes care of everyone in need. And it's reassuring to know that it's not necessary to mention them individually by name because God knows them all anyway. Don't get me wrong: there's certainly no problem in mentioning people by name. Just remember: God knows them all and doesn't need us to remind him!



Saint of the Week

Saint Blaise Died: 316 Feast Day: Feb. 3

Saint Blaise is a bishop and martyr who lived in the fourth century in Turkey and Armenia. For a time, Blaise lived in a cave to escape persecution. On his feast, the Church recalls a mira-

cle cure associated with him and celebrates the blessing of the throats. Blaise apparently saved the life of a boy who was choking on a fish bone. The saint said that anyone who lit a candle in his memory would be free of infection, thus candles are used in the traditional throat blessing. He is listed among the Fourteen Holy Helpers, saints revered as healers. He is the patron saint of throat illnesses, animals, wool combers and wool trading.

"Just Wait": A Letter from a Newlywed Couple

Dear The Dating, The Engaged, The Married...

Valerie: "Just wait. It'll get worse when you're married." "Just wait until you've been married for a year..." "Just wait until the seven year itch..." "Just wait until you've been married as long as we have..."

The "just wait until..." scale seems to be sliding further and further away no matter how long you've been married. My husband, Rocco, and I have been married for a little over a year and a half and are determined to tell anyone who will listen just how amazing marriage is! Marriage is a gift from God!

Rocco: I can't count how many times I've heard "Oh, you're engaged? Congratulations, but just wait for marriage..." or "Oh, you're newlyweds? Congratulations, but just wait until after the 'honeymoon' phase..." These are messages delivered with a sense of impending doom. At work or elsewhere, these "just waits" are often accompanied by comments about "the old ball and chain," snide remarks about spouses and all kinds of dubious marriage advice.

Valerie: I guess we are never quite married long enough to be considered to know what married life is like, but we would disagree. At no point do Rocco and I think we know everything about marriage. We are learning more and more about one another and about married life every day. But to those who are engaged, to those who are dating, to those who believe their vocation is to one day get married, to those who have already spoken those vows, take heart: Marriage is an amazing, life changing, ridiculously fun adventure!

Rocco: I'm on a mission: God created me to love Val and sacrifice my life for her. He created her to be my perfect match. And for those whom God calls to the vocation of marriage, He's created a perfect match for you as well. Forget anything you've heard from people who've become disillusioned and instead "just wait" for the joy, the excitement, the laughter and the sheer fun of what's to come!

Just wait... until you come home and your husband, who has just come home from work, has the fire going in the fireplace, Christmas lights plugged in and hot chocolate set out for you.

Just wait...until you come home to a house full of balloons and a gigantic card on your birthday and you realize how hard your wife worked to see your joy and that she's been planning this moment for a long time.

Just wait... until the first snow since you've been married and your husband goes outside and creates a huge heart in the road to show you from the upstairs window.

Just wait... until she hatches a plan to feed the homeless and you remember how much you love her generosity and compassion.

Just wait... until you find the love note he hid around the house for you to find during the day.

Just wait... until you get to open your lunch bag to read the love note she wrote you that morning.

Just wait... until your husband comes home from work and the first thing he does is run, literally run, to find you, lift you up in an embrace, spin you around and give you a "hello" kiss.

Fact of Faith

Dignity of the Human Person

Over centuries, the Catholic Church has developed a set of principles that underlie its teaching on moral issues. More than a list of commandments and thou-shalt-nots, these principles can be discerned from the scriptures and from hundreds of years of reflection on the relationships between human beings and God.

The starting point for Catholic social teaching is the inherent dignity of every human person. In the Sacred Constitution "The Church in the Modern World" from the Second Vatican Council we read. "There is a growing awareness of the sublime dignity of human persons, who stand above all things and whose rights and duties are universal and inviolable. They ought, therefore, to have ready access to all that is necessary for living a genuinely human life: for example, food, clothing, housing, ... the right to education, and work ... " Because we are made in the image of God, and the human person is the clearest reflection of God among us, we are required to honor and respect the human person and to acknowledge that all human beings have rights.

The most basic human right is the right to life itself. The church's stance protecting human life is based as much on this right as it is on the commandment that says "thou shalt not kill." And because we believe that *all* human life is sacred, the church believes it must be protected for all persons, from conception to natural death.

For Catholics, human life and human dignity are absolutes. That's why we must accord the same respect and honor to all human beings: the unborn, the handicapped, the elderly, criminals, foreigners, enemies, immigrants, everyone. This is a challenging principle, a radical stance that sometimes sets us apart from our culture. But it's a principle as basic as God telling us, "Love one another, as I have loved you."

A Stewardship Call to Action from Pope Francis

"Money must serve, not rule!" This is how Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, put the emphasis on one of seven major themes in his pastoral letter, *Evangelii Gaudium (The Joy of the Gospel)*. The pontiff's letter, formally referred to as an "apostolic exhortation," devotes itself to the subject of the new evangelization, and shares ideas about how the church can reform itself in order to embrace a renewed sense of mission.

One of our Holy Father's urgent concerns is how the poor of the world are being treated. In his letter he states emphatically that he loves everyone, both rich and poor, but that he is obliged in the name of Jesus Christ to remind everyone that the rich have a responsibility "... to help, respect and promote the poor" (par. 58).

Pope Francis is especially concerned about the growing global economic inequity and challenges world political and financial leaders to use our economic systems in a way that favors human beings: *Just as the commandment "Thou shalt not kill"*

sets a clear limit in order to safeguard the value of human life, today we also have to say "thou shalt not" to an economy of exclusion and inequality. Such an economy kills. How can it be that it is not a news item when an elderly homeless person dies of exposure, but it is news when the stock market loses two points? (par. 52).

The pope is insistent: God calls us to make a committed response to the poor in a way that transcends the logic of the marketplace.

In his Christmas message, Pope Francis urged us to "place ourselves at the service of the poor, make ourselves small and poor with them." He does not condemn capitalism, nor does he favor a Marxist view of economics. He is challenging each of us to follow Christ and be good stewards of his gospel message which includes loving God and neighbor, especially the poor, the prisoners, the sick and the outcast; all whom Jesus makes reference to in his teaching on the final judgment of the nations in the Gospel of Matthew (25:31-46). It is a call to action Pope Francis urges upon us as we continue to move through this new year.




