A Letter from the Pastor

Dear Friends,

In case you missed my announcement at Mass last weekend, the Diocese of Las Vegas has posted the new priest assignments for the coming year. St. Elizabeth Ann Seton parish will have quite a few changes.

On July 1, I will be leaving our parish to begin my new assignment as pastor of St. Thomas More Catholic Church in Henderson. Rev. Jim Jankowski, pastor of St. John Neumann Catholic Church in North Las Vegas, has been appointed as the new pastor of SEAS, also effective July 1. In addition, SEAS will be welcoming Rev. Jose Unlayao as parochial vicar and Rev. Luis Van Dam who will be the hospital minister for the parishes of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton and St. Anthony of Padua beginning August 1, 2019. Rev. Lourdes Jayamanne will take over as administrator of Sacred Heart Church in Ely, Nevada. Other priest assignments for our diocese are listed below with more news from the diocese coming soon.

Fr. Jim Jankowski is no stranger to our parish. He first came to SEAS in August 2010 as associate pastor. He transitioned into administrator the following year until my arrival in July 2012. Fr. Jim also celebrates TV Masses at SEAS quite frequently. I'm sure many of you will remember him and warmly welcome his return.

Next week, Fr. Lourdes, Fr. David, and I will be joining our fellow diocesan priests for our annual summer retreat from June 3-7 at Vallombrosa Center in Menlo Park, Ca. In our absence, Fr. Tom and Fr. Dan will be celebrating daily Mass, and as always, the parish staff will be here to help you with anything you need. The following week, I will be taking some personal time off as I prepare for my move to Henderson. I ask you to pray for me during this time of transition.

I would like to thank you for your kind words upon hearing the news of my departure. I would also like to thank those who have already made a pledge to our capital campaign. Many of you have asked what will happen with the capital campaign now that I am leaving. As I stated last weekend, the campaign will continue to move forward as planned. Priests come, and priests go, but the parish community remains. St. Elizabeth Ann Seton is your parish. You and those who come after you will be the beneficiaries of what you accomplish through the campaign. I ask every family to do their part, no matter how big or how small, so St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Church will continue to thrive.



Feet on the Ground

"Until next week, keep your feet on the ground and keep reaching for the stars!" Not today's scriptural wisdom, but legendary DJ Casey Kasem's sage advice, heard across America for generations, American Top 40's challenging signoff. Though Casey wasn't quoting scripture, today's Acts of the Apostles offers similar advice. As Jesus ascended, disciples "were looking intently at the sky." Wouldn't we prefer a soul-relaxing gaze into peaceful blue skies to a heart-breaking focus on this blood-stained earth? But heavenly questioners asked Jesus' first disciples, "Why are you standing there looking at the sky?" Earth awaited their mission! While our hearts should "keep reaching for" heaven, we need to "keep our feet on the ground." Ascension's scriptures remind us: the Jesus we revere as "ascended into heaven" lives right here among us on earth, awaiting our recognition and loving service.

Treasures From Our Tradition

The mystery of the Ascension has to do with holding in tension a sense of God's nearness, along with the burden caused by apparent signs of absence. The risen Jesus says to Mary Magdalene, "Do not cling to me," perhaps pointing out to her that his physical presence to the disciples was time -bound and temporary. It was a gift for their transformation, and after forty days, he vanished from their sight and hearing, though never out of their consciousness.

They do not mourn at his going this time: there is no trace of the disciples who hid in fear at his crucifixion, no sense of the women who wept softly as they carried ointments to the tomb through the dewy morning light. Instead, the scriptural accounts show them full of joy, comforted by his promise to be with them forever, and open to the Spirit's power. They are joyful, energized, aware, and united with one another in love. They seem to grasp an awareness that if the mission to the whole world was a serious one, then the presence of the Risen Christ could not be pinned down to any one place or time, but had to be always and everywhere completely available. All peoples, all times, all cultures were opened to receive him in this moment of the Ascension. The energy of this feast is drawn not from absence, but renewed and deeper presence.



Did You Receive a Pledge Card in the Mail? If So, Please Return It.



Living The Faith

Easter's Final Word

Pain-free suffering: What a contradiction in terms! When suffering enters within the boundaries of our existence, it often arrives bearing the greatest of disappointments or frustrations. It may offer sadness or physical pain. It may drain us. Sometimes suffering makes us angry.

Given all of that, it is amazing that anything good ever takes root in environments of suffering. Yet, all sorts of people testify that this happens.

Perhaps they expanded as human beings while caring for a sick child or spouse. Perhaps their pain over a job loss yielded an overdue recognition that they were called to an entirely different kind of work.

Looking back upon a period of genuine suffering, many are certain God was active in their lives the entire time, though they understood this only in retrospect. In the end, they believed God was faithful to them and that, yet again, they were asked to respond faithfully to God.

The surprise in suffering is that it can be life-giving. But suffering most definitely is not pain-free. What is hard is the way suffering seems to erect a wall blocking our view of life as we knew it. Suffering can be confusing and disorienting. Frequently people just don't know what to do about their suffering. They may feel alone, even when with others.

Suffering is the kind of invader that appears at first to be closing a door in our faces -- a door we cannot see beyond. It feels as if suffering, or its cause, pronounces a final word for us.

It is all the more surprising, then, that so many people say later that suffering was not the final word. Hope somehow reawakened (or was reawakened) for them, and suffering was not accorded final-word status.

The need for hope is one reason it is essential that people not be abandoned to suffer alone. In a 2010 pastoral reflection on suffering, New Zealand's Catholic bishops said: "Unable to avoid suffering, none of us should have to meet it alone. … The simplest sign of love can make all the difference to a person's ability to find peace and purpose amidst even the severest discomfort."

The mystery of Easter connects suffering and love. It makes this connection without denying the painful reality of Christ's suffering. In light of this, the Easter mystery relates pointedly to the actual lives people lead.

It is love that "is the final word spoken over human life, and this word is spoken personally to us by God," Bishop Daniel E. Flores of Brownsville, Texas, said in a 2010 address.

He commented that having "a deep sense of and conviction about the triumph of love over death and despair is the grace of Christian hope."

Taken together, the events in Christ's life leading to Easter form what is known as the "paschal mystery." This term, as Pope Benedict XVI explained while visiting New York in 2008, "refers to Christ's passion, his death and resurrection," along with his ascension.

The paschal mystery encompasses what Pope Benedict, during the August 2011 World Youth

Day in Madrid, Spain, described as the "mysterious wisdom of the cross by which man lives." The pope promptly added, "The cross was not a sign of failure, but an expression of self-giving love."

British Cardinal Cormac Murphy-O'Connor similarly pointed out in a 2010 speech that in the paschal mystery "we touch the core of Christ's life ... his continuous self-gift, which never ceases, even in the silence of the cross."

At Easter, then, the final word is "love." Happily, in my view, that does not mean Easter somehow glosses over the facts about Christ's suffering by suggesting it was of a pain-free variety. What Easter does announce is the possibility of hope, which is essential for suffering people.

Gibson served on Catholic News Service's editorial staff for 37 years.



Fact of Faith

The Ascension

On the Feast of the Ascension, the Church celebrates the return of Christ to the Father, his physical body leaving the earth behind.

In John's Gospel, Jesus makes it clear that his return to the Father is necessary so that the Holy Spirit can be given to his disciples.

For many years, this feast was celebrated as a Holy Day of Obligation on the Thursday after the Sixth Sunday of Easter. The precise date moved from year to year, as the date of Easter moved based on the lunar calendar. Not long ago, most of the diocese in the United States moved the celebration of the Ascension to the Seventh Sunday of Easter. The ecclesiastical provinces of Boston, Hartford, New York, Newark, Philadelphia, and the State of Nebraska have maintained the celebration on the Thursday after the sixth Sunday of Easter.

So, why couldn't the risen Christ have simply stayed with us, guiding the Church on Earth for all time? Imagine what the world would look like today if Christ has not ascended. If Christ were still walking the earth, what would faith be? Where would our free will be?

My own opinion is that it was necessary for Christ to ascend and send the Holy spirit so that our faith would matter, and our free will remain intact. God is still with us, and present to us, but in ways that allow us to freely choose to accept or reject his grace. Christ is present in the Eucharist, in the Word of God proclaimed, and in his Body the Church. The Holy Spirit is present to us, dwelling within us, received at our Baptism and sealed at our Confirmation. But these ways of remaining with us are not so concrete that our free will is collapsed. He has the ability to choose the Good, and to choose to accept God's grace, and he's never going to do anything that makes that choice less meaningful.

So, the feast of the Ascension is important to us, not because it's a big "good-bye" to Jesus, but be-

cause it ushers in a new era in which Christ continues to be present to us, and in which the Holy Spirit dwells in the hearts of all believers.

Saint of the Week

Charles Lwanga and Companions 1860 - 1886 Feast Day - June 3

Charles and 21 other Ugandan martyrs, ages 14 to 30, were officials and pages in the court of King Mwanga II of Buganda. The king, after first accepting Christianity among his people, began to insist that converts abandon their new faith. He also preyed sexually on the young men at court. As head of the pages and their chief catechist, Charles tried to protect his charges. But, when they would not reject Christianity, they were killed in 1885-86; some were speared to death and others, like Charles, were burned alive. These first martyrs from sub-Saharan Africa were canonized in Uganda in 1964 by Pope Paul VI; they are the patrons of African Catholic Youth Action, converts and torture victims.

"This is the place where Christ's light shone on your land with a particular splendor. This was the place of darkness, Namugongo, where Christ's light shone bright in the great fire which consumed Saint Charles Lwanga and his companions. May the light of that holocaust never cease to shine in Africa! The heroic sacrifice of the Martyrs helped to draw Uganda and all of Africa to Christ, the true light which enlightens all men (Cf. ibid. 1: 9)." 


