

Sacrament of Baptism

Baptisms for infants and children up to 7 years of age are celebrated on Sundays either during Mass or at 1:45pm. Parents and Godparents should attend the baptism class on the first Tuesday of the month at 6:30 pm in the Parish Hall classrooms. Adults are baptized at the Easter Vigil after completing the stages of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA).

A Letter from the Pastor

Dear Friends,

This Tuesday, March 26 is the day our parish has set aside to celebrate the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. There will be several priests joining us to celebrate this sacrament in the church from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. As you know, the season of Lent is the time for us to prepare to renew our Baptismal promises. I invite every one of you to join us this Tuesday and rejoice in God's gift of forgiveness. Celebrating the Sacrament of Reconciliation/Confession during Lent will allow us to renew our commitment at Easter with a pure and renewed heart and mind.

Some of you have asked why we are reciting the Apostles' Creed instead of the Nicene Creed as our profession of faith during the season of Lent. The reason is because of its close relationship to baptism. Baptism is a rebirth into new life, a spiritual resurrection. The Apostles' Creed is the baptismal Symbol of the Roman Catholic Church. It is the basis for the baptismal promises made by the elect before they are baptized. The elect are those who are preparing to receive the sacraments of initiation – baptism, Eucharist and confirmationinto the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil. The Apostles' Creed is also used for the renewal of baptismal promises at Easter and by parents and godparents when bringing a child for baptism.

I would like to thank everyone who attended our Lenten Mission March 11-13. I trust you will join me in praising our mission presenter Fr. Michael Renninger for doing a wonderful job. He gave us much to think about and offered great insight to help make our journey through Lent more meaningful.

Lastly, I would like to congratulate Fr. Lourdes on the 25th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. It has been just over a year since he arrived at our parish from Sri Lanka to help minister to the sick, hospitalized and homebound in our community. We thank him for all he has done for our parish and for his 25 years of service to God's people. Join me in celebrating with him this weekend in the Parish Hall after the 4:00 p.m. Saturday Mass and after the 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. Masses on Sunday.



Mid-Lent Check-In

God says to Moses, "This is what you shall tell the Israelites: I AM sent me to you ... The LORD, the God of your [ancestors], the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, the God of Jacob" (Exodus 3:14, 15). As Jesus would later say. God is not a God of the dead, but of the living, and so we believe that the dead will one day rise. At this midpoint of Lent, we pause to consider how our repentance is leading us to the Resurrection, to our reunion with the great "I AM." Part of our repentance involves working to secure justice for all and helping our neighbor to live in God's ways. We encourage each other and nurture each other, like the compassionate gardener of today's Gospel, who tells the owner of the orchard that he will nurture the tree, fertilize it, and perhaps it will bear fruit.

Saint of the Week

Toribio of Mogrovejo 1538—1606 Feast Day—March 23

Spanish-born Toribio taught law in Salamanca until 1574, when he was appointed inquisitor of Granada. In 1580, though not yet a priest, he was named arch-bishop of Lima, Peru, with his episcopal ordination in Seville. After arriving in Lima in 1581, his 25 years of missionary service included diocesan and provincial synods, visits around the vast diocese, clergy reforms, and Indian-language catechisms. He also introduced European religious orders into Peru, opened the first seminary in the New World and encouraged Indians to become priests.

"St Turibius expressed his deep missionary spirit in certain significant ways, such as his effort to learn different languages, in order to preach personally to all who were entrusted to his pastoral care. However, he was also an example of respect for the dignity of every human person, whatever his or her condition, in whom he always tried to awaken happiness at being a true child of God." —Pope Benedict XVI, March 23, 2006

The Third Sunday of Lent

How to Go to Confession..

May the Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ, the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and of all the saints,

whatever good you do and suffering you endure, heal your sins, help you grow in holiness, and reward you with eternal life. Go in peace. (Rite of Penance, no. 93)

- Preparation: Before going to confession, take some time to prepare. Begin with prayer, and reflect on your life since your last confession. How have you—in your thoughts, words, and actions—neglected to live Christ's commands to "love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind," and to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Mt 22:37, 39)? As a help with this "examination of conscience," you might review the Ten Commandments or the Beatitudes (Ex 20:2-17; Dt 5:6-21; Mt 5:3-10; or Lk 6:20-26).
- 2. **Greeting:** The priest will welcome you; he may say a short blessing or read a Scripture passage.
- 3. **The Sign of the Cross:** Together, you and the priest will make the Sign of the Cross. You may then begin your confession with these or similar words: "Bless me, Father, for I have sinned. It has been [give days, months, or years] since my last confession."
- 4. **Confession:** Confess all your sins to the priest. If you are unsure what to say, ask the priest for help. When you are finished, conclude with these or similar words: "I am sorry for these and all my sins."
- 5. **Penance:** The priest will propose an act of penance. The penance might be prayer, a work of mercy, or an act of charity. He might also counsel you on how to better live a Christian life.

6. Act of Contrition: After the priest has conferred your penance, pray an Act of Contrition, expressing sorrow for your sins and resolving to sin no more. A suggested Act of Contrition is:

My God,

I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good, I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our Savior Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In his name, my God, have mercy. (Rite of Penance, no. 45)

- 7. **Absolution:** The priest will extend his hands over your head and pronounce the words of absolution. You respond, "Amen."
- Praise: The priest will usually praise the mercy of God and will invite you to do the same. For example, the priest may say, "Give thanks to the Lord for he is good." And your response would be, "His mercy endures for ever."

(Rite of Penance, no. 47).

9. **Dismissal:** The priest will conclude the sacrament, often saying, "Go in peace."

If it has been a while since your last confession, remember, "Do not fear" (Is 41:10). The priest will help guide you. And feel free to take this how-to guide with you! For more information, visit <u>www.usccb.org/confession</u>.

Salt and Light

The Spiritual Works of Mercy

The Spiritual Works of Mercy have long been a part of the Christian tradition, appearing in the works of theologians and spiritual writers throughout history. Just as Jesus attended to the spiritual well-being of those he ministered to, these Spiritual Works of Mercy guide us to help our neighbors and their spiritual needs.

Counseling the Doubtful

Everyone has moments of doubt in their faith journey. Nevertheless, we should always remember that Christ is the Way, the Truth, and the Life and turn to him along our way.

Examples:

- Has someone asked you for advice? Orient your response to Christ, who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life.
- Follow Christ with the witness of your life so that others may see God's love revealed in your actions.
- Accompany a friend who is struggling with believing to join a parish group for service or faith formation, share a book you found useful in dealing with your friend's faith concern, and worship at Sunday Mass.

Instructing the Ignorant

Learn about our faith and be open to talking with others about our beliefs. There is always something more to discover about our faith.

Examples:

- Go on a service trip or short-term mission trip. No time? Donate to support someone on their service trip.
- Volunteer to help with religious education programs at your parish.
- Invite someone to go to Mass with you this weekend.

Admonishing the Sinner

Do not judge but be supportive in helping others find their way and correct their mistakes. Together we can learn to walk more closely with Christ.

Examples:

- In humility we must strive to create a culture that does not accept sin, while realizing that we all fall at times.
- Don't judge, but guide others toward the path of salvation. (see Mt 7:1-2)
- When you correct someone, don't be arrogant. We are all in need of God's loving correction.

Comforting the Sorrowful

Be open to listening and comforting those who are dealing with grief. Even if we aren't sure of the right words to say, our presence can make a big difference.

Examples:

- Lend a listening ear to those going through a tough time.
- Make a home cooked meal for a friend who is facing a difficult time.
- Write a letter or send a card to someone who is suffering.
- A few moments of your day may make a lifetime of difference to someone who is going through a difficult time.

Forgiving Injuries

Forgiving others is difficult at times because we do not have God's limitless mercy and compassion. But Jesus teaches us that we should forgive as God forgives, relying on him to help us show others the mercy of God.

Examples:

- Let go of grudges.
- Saying sorry is something we learn as kids, but how often do we really mean it? Forgiveness transforms hearts and lives.
- Participate in the Sacrament of Penance.
- Pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet.

Bearing Wrongs Patiently

Do not be bitter about wrongs done against you. Place your hope in God so that you can endure the troubles of this world and face them with a compassionate spirit.

Frustrated with someone? Step away from the situation, take a few deep breaths, pray the Our Father, asking God for patience.

Praying for the Living and the Dead

Prayer is one of the most powerful ways we can support others. Joining together in prayer for the living and the dead entrusts us all into God's care.

Examples:

- Request a Mass intention for a friend or family member who is going through a tough time.
- Request a Mass intention for a friend or family member who has passed away.
- Keep your own book of prayer intentions, writing down the names of those who you are keeping in your prayers.
- Ask a friend or family member if there is anything you can pray for them about .
- Through prayer, entrust your cares and concerns for those around you to God.

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Fact of Faith

The Annunciation

During the season of Lent, Catholic churches are adorned in purple, symbolizing repentance and solemnity. There are at least two occasions during Lent, however, when the liturgical colors change, at least briefly. One such occasion is the fourth Sunday of Lent, which used to be called Laetare Sunday. On that Sunday, churches—if they have them—can use rose-colored vestments and paraments. Another occasion to put away the purple for the day is the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Lord.

The feast of the Annunciation is on March 25, for reasons that I hope are obvious. Start with Christ-



mas on December 25, and subtract nine months, and you'll get the reason for the feast. The Annunciation celebrates the coming of the Archangel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary and announcing to her that she is to be the mother of the Savior. This event has been one of the classic religious subjects of Western art for centuries. The next time you're at your computer, go to the Google search engine, and search for the word "Annunciation," then click on the tab that says "Images." You'll find hundreds of painting of the Annunciation. Most of these depict the archangel appearing to Mary. She is depicted holding a book; a visual reference to the fact that her child would fulfill the words of the Old Testament prophets. The coming of the Holy Spirit is portrayed by a descending dove or by a ray of light shining from heaven.

On the feast of the Annunciation, we switch to white vestments and pray the Gloria at the beginning of the Mass, both are symbols of the joy that accompanies the Incarnation—Christ becoming human and choosing to be born as one of us. Even during the solemn penitential season of Lent, the Church acknowledges the coming of the Savior with hope and joy.

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The Third Sunday of Lent

The Scrutinies

Every time we celebrate the sacrament of baptism, we ask the questions, "Do you renounce Satan? and all his works? and all his empty promises?" These are serious questions. We should consider them carefully before answering. And that is what the elect, those preparing to be baptized at the Easter Vigil, spend much of Lent doing.

For those who are making their final preparation for baptism, Lent is a time of purification and enlightenment. They examine their lives in the light of God's word and ask the entire Christian community to pray that whatever is weak and sinful within them may be eliminated and that whatever is good and holy may be affirmed. And we do. After the homily, in a litany of intercession, we proclaim the power of Jesus over all sin. Then we pray over the elect for their deliverance and strengthening. The presider, catechists, sponsors and other members of the community also may lay their hands on the heads of the elect in an ancient sign of forgiveness, healing and empowerment.

And because the entire community will renew its baptismal promises at Easter, we too examine our lives in light of God's word. Of course, this is something we should be doing throughout the year, but we focus on this self-examination in a special way during Lent. In every community that will baptize adults or older children at the Easter Vigil, special rites known as the "scrutinies" are celebrated at liturgy on the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent.

On these Sundays, the gospel readings are from the Gospel of John; they are the stories of the Samaritan woman whom Jesus meets at Jacob's well, the healing and coming to faith of the man born blind and the raising of Lazarus from the dead. These readings have been used for centuries to prepare the elect and the church for baptism. The readings focus on sin and redemption using the images of thirst and water, darkness and light, death and life. By examining ourselves through these readings, we come to know how we have become parched, how we have been blinded, how we have become deadened through sin. When we and the elect are asked at Easter to renounce Satan, evil works and empty promises, our answer can be a thoughtful, strong and heartfelt "I do."

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Sacraments of Initiation

At the Easter Vigil, these eighteen individuals will receive the sacraments of initiation—baptism, confirmation, and holy Eucharist—and be welcomed into the Roman Catholic Church. The vigil takes place on Holy Saturday before Easter Sunday beginning at 7:30 p.m. It is a lengthy service, but it is well worth the time and effort. The Easter Vigil is the highlight of the Church's year. Please consider attending the vigil, and please keep our elect in your prayers.

Being a Good Steward of Lent


Every liturgical season has its natural stewardship connection, providing seasonal focus and themes for spiritual growth. Perhaps no season is as rich as Lent in providing a springboard for exploration, reflection, and transformation. Let us consider Lent as a gift which we are called to steward well.

Part of our Catholic culture: I often tell people who are ready to adopt new practices or to deepen current ones that Lent has great potential, because Catholics will do things during Lent that they will not do any other time of the year! Whether we were baptized as infants or were initiated as adults, Lent is a season that connects to our daily lives. The three traditional practices of prayer, fasting and almsgiving lead us to live each day as good stewards who put God first and who think about and act on behalf of others.

Metanoia: Lent is a season of turning away, turning toward, and turning around. Jesus tells us to repent and believe in the Gospel. The repentance of Lent is about turning away from sin, and it is about turning toward God. We are invited to turn our lives around, to embrace the way of Christ as people who are truly committed to grow in his selfgiving way. This turning can also be one of accepting the call to grow as good stewards, as we turn away from selfishness, self-centeredness, and sinfulness, and turn toward God as the giver of all good gifts.

Simplicity and Sacrifice: During Lent, we encounter again Jesus' mercy, forgiveness, healing, and salvation, and we recognize more fully the depths of Christ's sacrifice on the cross. Jesus' sacrifice challenges us to give of ourselves, our talents, time, prayer, attention, and resources. This call to sacrifice also leads us to separate our wants from our needs, inviting us to simplify our lives, rid ourselves of unnecessary material possessions, and open our hearts to the grace of life lived in imitation of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Why do we need religious art and furnishing in the church?

As stated in, *Built of Living Stones: Art, Architecture, and Worship—Guidelines of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops,* art is meant to bring the divine to the human world, to the level of the senses, then, from the spiritual insight gained through the senses and the stirring of the emotions, to raise the human world to God, to his inexpressible kingdom of mystery, beauty, and life.

Authentic art is integral to the Church at prayer because these objects and actions are "signs and symbols of the supernatural world" and expressions of the divine presence. Artistic creations inspire contemplation and devotion with every visible and tactile detail of architecture possessing the potential to express the wholeness, harmony and radiance of profound beauty.

Appropriately fashioned, quality artwork is evident in the honesty and genuineness of the materials that are used, the nobility of the form embodied in them, the love and care that goes into the creation of the work of art, and the personal stamp of the artist whose special gift produces a harmonious whole and well-crafted work. The integrity and energy of a piece of art, produced individually by the labor of an artist, is always to be preferred above objects that are mass-produced.

When artists are called upon to serve the Christian community, there is an "ethic," a "spirituality of artistic service." Breadth of imagination enables an artist to communicate deep meaning and powerful religious sentiment with grace and sensitivity. This gift from God is combined with refined educated talents that execute elegantly crafted objects for the glory of God and the good of the community. A truly worthy and beautiful artwork can express the intentions, faith, and life of that community and can even transform it. Beautiful, compelling artwork draws the people of God into a deeper awareness of their lives and of their common goals as a Christian community as well as of their roles and responsibilities in the wider world. Art that fulfills these qualities is art worthy of the Christian assembly.

Shouldn't we be helping the poor instead of enhancing our church?

It's not a question of doing one or the other—we can do both!

Just as Jesus showed great compassion for the poor and oppressed, the Church has always cared for the disadvantaged and continues to carry out this great tradition of charity today. Here at SEAS, our Outreach Ministry is committed to the mission of advocating for and ministering to those in need. It is a vibrant ministry that continues to grow daily-in the number of services offered, in the number of people served, and in the number of people who want to serve. The ministry actively seeks out ways to help those in need while creating diverse opportunities for our parishioners to volunteer through the giving of their time, talent and treasure. Our parish will continue to help the poor, the disadvantaged and the sick through our ministries and through other outreach opportunities. And we will continue to encourage our entire parish community to join us in being the compassion of Christ to others, especially to those in need.

"For the poor you will always have with you in the land. Therefore I command you, 'You shall open wide your hand to your brother, to the needy and to the poor, in your land." (Deut. 15:11)

There will be a time when each of us as believers will be called to give an account of our lives in service to Christ; therefore, we should always be looking for ways to glorify God and build the Church through our good works in the name of Christ.

As for our church enhancements, we are inspired by the story of creation. The Book of Genesis tells us that the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, but in 6 days

It was not an accident, a mistake, or the product of an inferior deity, but beauty through God's selfexpression.


