

A Letter from the Pastor

Dear Friends,

We are now more than half way through the season of Lent. How has your journey been going so far? Are you making the progress you intended to make before the season began? Maybe you've had a misstep or two along the way, or have fallen short of your own expectations. If so, do not get discouraged. There is still time! The important thing is that we keep trying. Remember the three pillars of the season: Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving. Following these three practices will help us stay on track and draw us closer to Christ.

As we enter the final two weeks of Lent, please continue attending Taize Prayer Service and Stations of the Cross. If you have not had the opportunity to participate in these religious observances, I highly encourage you to do so on April 5 and 12. Also, on Wednesday, April 10 at 7:00 p.m., our Youth Ministry will present the Living Stations of the Cross, a very unique rendition of this traditional devotion.

If you were not able to come to our Parish Lenten Day of Reconciliation last Tuesday, you can still receive the Sacrament of Penance here at our parish before Easter. During the season of Lent, confessions are heard Friday and Saturday mornings at 8:30 a.m. immediately following daily Mass and on Saturday afternoons from 3:00 p.m. to 3:45 p.m. But please note, no confessions will be heard on Good Friday or Holy Saturday.

As you practice acts of charity over these last days of Lent, I ask that you think about our Outreach Ministry. Consider bringing an extra can of food to the food pantry, donating candy or Easter items to the Easter Basket Drive, or volunteering to help in any number of ways within our Outreach Department. Your gifts will be a blessing to many.

This Monday, April 1, our diocese will celebrate the Chrism Mass at 5:00 p.m. at Holy Spirit Catholic Church. Two meaningful rituals occur during the Chrism Mass. First, the priests of our diocese will renew their vows to the priesthood. Second, Bishop Thomas will bless and distribute to each parish the three Holy Oils: the oil of catechumens, for adult and infant baptisms; the oil of the sick, for the sacrament of the anointing of the sick; and the oil of chrism, a fragranced oil for baptisms, confirmations, ordinations of priests and bishops, and the consecration of the altar. The Chrism Mass only happens once a year. If you've never celebrated it, please come, show your support for the priests who continue to serve the people of God, and witness one of the most significant liturgies of our Church.

Holy Week will begin on Palm Sunday, April 14. This year, Paulist Fr. James DiLuzio from Luke Live Missions and Retreats will be joining us for a Holy Week Retreat. This will be a new experience for our parish—one that I hope will bring us into a deeper appreciation for the most holy week of the Church year. Fr. DiLuzio will celebrate daily Mass at 8:00 a.m. on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Holy Week. Then, after Mass, he will share reflections of Jesus' Passion through the Gospel of Luke. He will also preach during the Easter Triduum. Please come and bring a friend.

As we know, Easter Triduum is one liturgy that spans over three days beginning with Holy Thursday and the Mass of the Lord's Supper, continuing through the Passion of our Lord on Good Friday, and culminating with the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday. I have said many times, it is the most beautiful and meaningful liturgy of the entire year that every person should experience at least once in their lifetime. I hope you will attend. I also want to encourage you to come to Morning Prayer at 8:00 a.m. each morning of the Triduum. Morning prayer joins our community of faith together as we consecrate each day in thanksgiving to God.

Today, after the 8am and 10am Masses, Sr. Joyce Zimmerman will give a presentation in the Parish Hall classrooms on liturgical environment and preparing sacred space for worship. Enhancing the church and refurbishing the primary altar furnishings is one of the categories that will be funded in our upcoming capital campaign. Some parishioners have asked why replacing our existing furnishings such as the altar and ambo are important. Sr. Joyce will explain the meaning and Catholic teaching behind these furnishings. I invite all parishioners to come and ask questions.

May you continue to grow closer to Christ this Lent,

About our Capital Campaign

What is the tuition for SEAS School and how does it compare to other Catholic and private schools in Las Vegas?

For the 2019-2020 school year, the SEAS parishioner tuition rate is \$6600. The non-parishioner rate is \$7500. We do not know the tuition rates for every non-parochial private school in Las Vegas, but in most cases, SEAS School tuition is less expensive than other private schools in our city. Tuition rates for private schools in Summerlin can be considerably higher than SEAS, at times, 2 to 3 times more expensive. In comparison to other Catholic schools in Las Vegas, SEAS is moderately more expensive.

As a school parent, is my tuition payment all I need to give to support our parish?

No. Based on a 400 student enrollment, the cost per student at SEAS is about \$8678 a year, so tuition does not cover the entire cost of educating each child. If the tuition rate is too high, enrollment will decline so fundraising through school activities such as the Apex Fun Run, and through events such as ARTESIA and the Boo Bash help make up the difference. Significant efforts are also made to raise money for tuition assistance. The Catholic education we provide is a ministry of our church; therefore, we are committed to keeping our tuition rate as affordable as possible while still being able to offer competitive pay for quality teachers and provide our students with the best educational programs. Also, as a parishioner you receive the parishioner rate, but we would like you to be a registered parishioner who participates in parish life, ministries and activities, and who enjoys fellowship with our faith community. Although the finances are separate, both the church and school are part of SEAS parish, and the church will subsidize the school when necessary.

Saint of the Week

Vincent Ferrer 1350—1419 Feast Day—April 5

Born in Valencia to an English father and Spanish mother, Vincent joined the Dominican friars in 1367 and became a noted preacher, making converts even among Jews and Muslims. After years of backing the Avignon papal claimants, Vincent withdrew his support, helping to end the papal schism that had divided the Western Church. He did intensive mission work in France, Spain and Italy, drawing huge revival-type crowds and gaining fame as a miracle worker. He died during a preaching tour of Brittany.

Living the Faith

Lenten Resolutions for Married Couples

Inspired by Pope Francis

Are you wondering how to grow in holiness this Lent, together with your spouse? Try following some advice from the pope! In his homilies and addresses, Pope Francis has spoken quite directly about how husband and wife should treat each other, about prayer within the family, and other ways the family lives its identity as a "domestic Church." So this Lent, why not commit with your spouse to try one of the following Lenten resolutions, based on words from the Holy Father?

- Be courteous to your spouse. Use polite requests: "May I? Can I?" For example, "Would you like for us to do this?" and "Do you want to go out tonight?" "To ask permission means to know how to enter with courtesy into the lives of others. ...True love does not impose itself harshly and aggressively." (Address to Engaged Couples, Rome, Feb. 14, 2014.)
- 2. Say "thank you" to your spouse. "It seems so easy to say these words, but we know that it is not. But it is important!... It is important to keep alive the awareness that the other person is a gift from God – and for the gifts of God we say thank you!" (Address to Engaged Couples, Rome, Feb. 14, 2014)
- Ask forgiveness from your spouse. Say, "I'm sorry." "Let us learn to acknowledge our mistakes and to ask for forgiveness. "Forgive me if today I raised my voice." "I'm sorry if I passed without greeting you." "Excuse me if I was late." (Address to Engaged Couples, Rome, Feb. 14, 2014) "Never let the sun go down without making peace! Never, never, never!" (Address to Engaged Couples, Rome, Feb. 14, 2014) "It is important to have the courage to ask forgiveness when we are at fault in the family." (Address to Participants in the Pilgrimage of Families, Rome, Oct. 26, 2013)
- 4. Pray together with your spouse and family. "Praying the Our Father together, around the


table, is not something extraordinary: it's easy. And praying the Rosary together, as a family, is very beautiful and a source of great strength! And also praying for one another! The husband for his wife, the wife for her husband, both together for their children, the children for their grandparents...praying for each other. This is what it means to pray in the family and it is what makes the family strong: prayer." (Homily for Family Day, Rome, Oct. 27, 2013) Pray to the Lord to "multiply your love and give it to you fresh and good each day." Pray together, "Lord, give us this day our daily love." (Address to Engaged Couples, Rome, Feb. 14, 2014)

- 5. Visit the elderly, especially your grandparents. "Grandparents are like the wisdom of the family, they are the wisdom of a people." "Listen to your grandparents." (Address to Participants in the Pilgrimage of Families, Rome, Oct. 26, 2013) "How important grandparents are for family life, for passing on the human and religious heritage which is so essential for each and every society!" (Angelus at World Youth Day, Rio de Janeiro, July 26, 2013)
- 6. Share the faith with others. "Christian families are missionary families. They are missionary also in everyday life, in their doing everyday things, as they bring to everything the salt and the leaven of faith!" (Homily for Family Day, Rome, Oct. 27, 2013)

Treasures From Our Tradition

Today, "Laetare Sunday," breaks the somberness of Lent for a little rejoicing, and the readings all summon us to an awareness of reconciliation. One of the best-loved stories of our tradition is today's Gospel story of the runaway son and the prodigal father. Prodigal, of course, is an adjective meaning "spendthrift or extravagant to a degree bordering on recklessness," and although the boy maxes out the credit cards, it is really the father who is prodigal with forgiveness.

Part of the excitement of this Laetare Sunday is rooted in the ancient catechumenate. Long ago, midway through Lent, the "elect" were focusing more and more on the gift of reconciliation accomplished for them by Christ and about to be realized in the Easter sacraments they were preparing to celebrate. In some places, the elect were even bedecked with roses on this day. A person bedecked with roses sticks out in a crowd; a person formed by the Eucharist and committed to living a life of reconciliation does, too. That's you!






Sacraments of Initiation

Good Stewards Learn to Develop God's Gifts

by Rev. Joseph D. Creedon, pastor emeritus, Christ the King Parish, Providence, Rhode Island. This excerpt is seventh in a series based on his current book.

God has blessed each of us with many gifts and our task is to discover, acknowledge and develop those gifts. Some of our gifts we discover ourselves; other gifts have to be pointed out by others. One of life's greatest challenges involves discovering and developing all of our God-given gifts. Parents, siblings, teachers, coaches, scout leaders and friends play an important role in this journey. Once we know we have a gift, we have to believe in the gift and commit ourselves to developing it.

We have to work on our gifts and have the discipline to hone them to perfection. Blessed John Cardinal Newman once said, "Nothing would be done at all if one waited until one could do it so well that no one could find fault with it." Many people are afraid to test their gifts. Fear of failure, it seems, is pervasive. We are not born with a fear of failure. Fear grows on us. Fear wears many disquises-fear of failure, fear of success, fear of ridicule, fear of not belonging, fear of looking foolish-to name but a few of fear's disguises. All of fear's disguises lead to stagnant energy. Fear always brings with it inertia and inertia always leads to stagnation. No one develops their gifts responsibly without risk-taking, hard work and overcoming fear.

Allow me to offer an example. Do you remember what it was like to learn how to ride a bicycle? We start off with a tricycle and for a while that is enough but soon we want more. We want a bicycle and the day comes when we get our first bicycle but our joy quickly fades when we realize that the bicycle comes with training wheels. So instead of going from three wheels to two wheels we go backwards to four wheels. Finally the fateful day comes when the training wheels are taken off. A person we thought loved us, usually a mother or a father, puts us on the bicycle, puts one hand on

the back of the seat and the other on the handlebar, tells us we can do it and pushes us off to fend for ourselves. The result is always the same – we fall to the ground. Then the person we thought loved us picks us up and repeats the process. Eventually we get the hang of it but not before we have fallen and picked ourselves up more often than we choose to remember.

The gift of balance is key to being able to ride a bicycle; the process of discovering that gift is repeated many times in our lives. Life is a series of failures that morph into successes sometimes without our realizing it or knowing how it happens but it does. We had to learn how to be brothers and sisters, we had to learn how to be husbands and wives, and we had to learn how to be friends and neighbors. We need to learn how to be good stewards of the many gifts God has given us; to discover them, cherish them and not be afraid to develop them.



Holy Week Customs

Why Do We Cover the Crucifix During Holy Week?

During the penitential season of Lent, Catholics often fast, abstain from eating meat on Fridays, make special sacrifices, give alms or financial support to those in need, and try to grow in their relationship with God and one another. All of these are ways we try to focus our attention on the penitential nature of the Lenten season. Another traditional practice in many churches is to cover or "veil" the crucifix. This tradition is often practiced during the week before Easter, starting on Palm Sunday and ending after the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday.

But why veil the crucifix? Let's face it, Catholics want the "familiar." We come to church, bless ourselves at the baptismal font, enter the pew, say our familiar prayers, and begin the Mass. We're so use to the "routine" and seeing the crucifix behind the altar that for some it becomes part of the liturgical decoration and thus loses its significance and symbolism. In a strange way, veiling the crucifix during Holy Week draws us out of the "familiar" and focuses our attention once again on the cross and on the magnitude of Christ's suffering and sacrifice on our behalf. It also serves to heighten our senses and build within us an anticipation and longing for Easter Sunday. Then, at the Easter Vigil, the crucifix is again revealed to focus our attention on the Resurrection and the great Easter promise of new life that Christ offers to us. As you gather with your parish community during this most solemn time of the Church year, let the symbolism of the veiled crucifix behind the altar deepen your appreciation for Christ's self-giving love ... a love manifested by the sacrifice of the cross and ritually realized every Mass in the celebration of the most holy Eucharist.




