

A Letter from Our Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

A JAM-PACKED WEEKEND, IT WAS!

If you had the privilege of attending last Sunday's 8AM, 10AM or 12PM Masses, you know what I'm talking about. At 8AM, we had an adult who was fully initiated as a Roman Catholic through the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Eucharist. Then there were 11 other adults who were also Confirmed, and one received his First Eucharist as well! It was a real celebration of the new life God has given to our parish family! At the 10AM, we celebrated the Rite of Acceptance for those unbaptized adults (catechumens) who will be fully initiated at our next Easter Vigil in 2020, and the Rite of Welcome for those adults joining us from another Christian tradition (candidates) who will complete their initiation as Roman Catholics next Easter as well. Fr. José celebrated an infant baptism at the 12PM Mass.

At the 8AM Mass, it was my first time celebrating an adult baptism utilizing our new full-immersion baptistry. I was a little apprehensive, but all went well until after the baptism when my slipper floated off my left foot. All in all, it was a jam-packed Sunday for a parish as active as ours.

I am ever so grateful to all those who expressed their joy and gratitude that they were able to be a part of these special and, yes, longer liturgies. It certainly doesn't happen every weekend, and there was ample warning given during the parish announcements and in the previous week's bulletin for everyone to make other arrangements if they had any time constraints. It would be a sad commentary if someone were to be upset at these celebrations of new life in our parish family. But, I wasn't born yesterday, and there's usually someone who will complain about anything out of the ordinary. At least those were few and far between, and not unlike other parishes in which I have ministered. But I am very pleased with the overwhelming positive and affirming responses at all of these special celebrations last weekend. It's a sign of a very healthy and vibrant faith community that continues to keep their hearts open to all that God has in store for all of us!

Many thanks to Marcie Wilske and her team who put so much effort to help others grow in their faith journey which brought them to these beautiful celebrations of the sacraments. And thanks to all those who helped behind the scenes to make sure it went as smoothly as possible. We couldn't do it without all of you!

RECENT LITURGICAL ADAPTATIONS

In recent weeks, we have been conducting some ongoing formation sessions and updating of our liturgical

ministers to help them become familiar with some adaptations to our liturgical procedures. We began with our altar servers, then sacristans followed by extraordinary Eucharistic ministers at Mass and to the homebound. This past week we met with our lectors and cantors. Next week we will complete the cycle by meeting with our ushers.

You may have noticed some of the adaptations already in practice. This weekend you will notice more of a consistency of how silence is incorporated within the Liturgy of the Word. In addition to the brief period of silence before we begin the proclamation of Sacred Scripture, there will be not only *audible silence* but *visual silence* incorporated after the 1st Reading, after the 2nd Reading and after the homily. After the proclamation of the 1st and 2nd Readings, there will be about a 20 second pause of audible and visual silence without any sound or movement. The lector will remain silent and still at the ambo after those readings to provide us with an uninterrupted space to give us the opportunity to let the Word of God sink in.

You may ask, "What am I supposed to do during those periods of silence?" Well, nothing is required, and "nothing" can be very enlightening! Being quiet with the Word of God is enough, or maybe a word or phrase may have touched you in one way or another. Just enjoy the silent pause and let God just "be" with you in the living Word.

You'll notice that there is no pause for silence after the sung Psalm Response. While the Psalm is certainly Sacred Scripture as well, its purpose is to be a response to the 1st Reading. Therefore, no silence is required after its proclamation.

WE NEED YOUR HELP!

You'll notice at many of the Masses, we are in desperate need of more ministers. Specifically, we need more ushers and extraordinary ministers of the Holy Eucharist. With a parish our size, we should be able to have adequate coverage for all of our liturgical ministries. Actually, it's quite easy to be a minister at Mass since you're there anyway. So, if you're not already involved, please consider helping with the various liturgical ministries. The more, the merrier! Won't you please consider or reconsider a liturgical ministry? Thanks!



We are nearing the end of the liturgical year. Today's readings remind us that our own lives will draw to a close one day, and we can be certain that the Lord will encourage, strengthen, and save us—both now and at the last. The astonishing story of the Maccabees invigorates our faith as we behold an entire family willing to die rather than deny the Law of Moses. The psalm response echoes the faithful cries of the Maccabees: "I call upon you, for you will answer me, O God." That same confidence appears in Saint Paul's letter to the Thessalonians. "The Lord is faithful," he testifies; "he will strengthen you and guard you from the evil one." In the Gospel, Jesus explains just how long God's protection will endure. The children of God whom God guards, Jesus says, will live forever like angels.



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Saint of the Week

Saint Frances Cabrini 1850 - 1917 Feast Day - November 13

In 1946, Mother Cabrini was the first U.S. citizen to be canonized; she is the universal patron of immigrants. She was born in

Italy, the youngest of 13 children, and became a schoolteacher. Denied admission to two religious orders because of frail health, she was given charge of an orphanage in Codogno. In 1880 she founded the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart with seven of her former orphans. The order spread rapidly from northern Italy to Rome, and then in 1889 to New York City, where Mother Cabrini became famous for her work among Italian immigrants. Before dying of malaria in Chicago, she had opened schools, orphanages and hospitals around the United States, South America and Europe.

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Living the Faith

25 Ways to Fight Fair

Please note that the words "fight" and "fighting fair" are used below to mean expressing one's disagreement or anger to another constructively. At no time should physical harm be considered "fighting fair."

- Know your own feelings. Seek to grow in selfawareness. Being in touch with your own true feelings is essential before you can constructively handle anger or conflict.
- Anger is an emotion neither right nor wrong in itself. There is no morality to feelings. Try to understand what prompted the feeling. Morality comes into play when you take a destructive action as a result of a feeling.
- 3. Negotiation and compromise are essential in any marriage. During a calm, clear moment agree that neither partner should "win" a fight. If one wins, the other loses and builds resentment. In effect, both have then lost because the relationship is damaged. Even when one spouse is wrong, permit him or her to salvage self-respect.
- 4. Cooling-off periods. Establish ground rules that permit either partner to "cool off" before trying to resolve anger. It may be necessary to walk or engage in some other physical activity in order to allow anger to dissipate. Such a period can allow a spouse to identify the issue more clearly and organize his or her thoughts, thus keeping the fight more on focus.
- 5. Pin down a time and place. Be sure, however, that resolving an issue is not postponed indefinitely. After cooling off, pin down a time and place to continue. For example, after the news goes off and in the living room not in the bathroom doorway while brushing teeth.
- Fight by mutual consent. Don't insist on a fight when your spouse is tired or unable to handle the strain. A fair fight requires two ready participants.
- 7. Stick to the subject. When a number of issues seem to be accumulating, present them one at a time. If you have not resolved past issues,

- put them on a current or future agenda. Make sure both of you go beyond skirmishing, insult rituals, or angry displays. Shooting broadside like a roaring cannon prevents resolution.
- State the issue honestly and clearly. Don't simply say, "I'm hurt by the way you don't show me respect." Rather, be clear and specific as in, "I felt hurt when you said...or when your tone of voice sounds condescending toward me."
- 9. Don't camouflage. Don't evade a deeper grievance by allowing your feelings to center only on less important or extraneous issues. "The potatoes are too salty tonight!" might be a minor irritant that covers the unspoken, "I don't think that you understand all the pressure I'm under at work!"
- 10. Afraid to fight? If one of you feels afraid to fight, this should not evoke a put down but rather may be a fear of being hurt or rejected. Put the fear on the agenda for later discussion.
- 11. Don't hit below the belt. Everyone has vulnerable areas. Don't use your confidential knowledge of your partner's weaknesses and sensitivities to hurt him/her.
- 12. Don't label. Avoid telling your spouse that he/ she is neurotic, depressing or a bore. Rather, try, "I'm tense inside, honey, because you seem moody and depressed. I'd like us to talk about it."
- 13. Grant equal time. Agree that no resolution of an issue can be presumed until each partner has had the chance to express his/her feelings, ideas and information.
- 14. Feedback and clarification. If the fight is emotional and heated, slow it down by starting a "feedback loop." One technique is to paraphrase back to your spouse what your heard. For example, "Honey, what I hear you saying is that I'm boring you because I have no outside interest. Is that right?" The other then responds by either confirming the accuracy of your statement or clarifying it.
- 15. Gain new understanding. Extract enough new information and insight from a fight to permit



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- growth. Don't waste a good fight by not learning from it.
- 16. Implement changes. Follow anger with a fair, firm, clear request for a change or improvement in whatever brought on the fight. Each partner must be clear as to what he/she agrees to modify or improve. Be specific and realistic. For example, it would be agreed that whenever the husband seemed tense, the wife would encourage him to tell her about it, instead of their old pattern of both keeping silent.
- 17. Develop humor. Humor goes a long way towards promoting healing.
- 18. Keep your fights to yourself. Exceptions would be when more serious problems suggest the need for a counselor. Good counseling is like medicine it helps do what you might not be able to do alone.
- 19. Handling anger in front of children. When anger and conflict initially erupt in front of children, also try to resolve these feelings in front of them. You may need a cooling off period first, but they need to learn about negotiation, discussion, and compromise by watching you do it constructively. Apologizing for excesses in front of children also teaches them about reconciliation.
- Don't attempt to resolve a conflict when drinking heavily.
- 21. "Touch" can begin dialogue. Use touch to help your spouse make the "entry" or "re-entry" into a communicative mood. A foot reaching over in bed, a hand on the shoulder can say eloquently, "Honey, one of us needs to begin the dialogue. I'm willing to start."
- 22. Exclude violence. Agree in advance that real violence is always ruled out.
- 23. Is the problem elsewhere? Determine through honest inner searching whether your anger lies primarily (or only secondarily) within the marriage relationship. Spouses might be struggling with poor health, role insecurities at work, fear of death, anxiety about the future, or other unresolved issues. It can be reassuring when a couple realizes that their relationship may not always be the principle problem, even though the real problem still causes anguish.

- 24. Respect crying. Crying is a valid response to how we feel. Do not, however, let crying sidetrack from getting to the real issue causing the conflict.
- 25. Prayer as strength. Major religions view marriage as sacred and prayer as a vital strength. While human behavior principles must not be neglected in learning how to handle conflict constructively, neither should couples neglect the religious resources of their faith in working out their problems.

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Treasures from Our Tradition

In the seventeenth century, English Catholics, many of them wealthy and well educated, looked to the American colonies as a place to regain a measure of religious freedom. In Ireland, the socalled penal laws were even harsher than in England, as a minority Parliament tried to force the conversion of the population by denying the majority political and economic power. Beginning in 1691, laws were passed that punished dissenters, principally Catholics, but also causing hardship for Jews, Quakers, and others. There were acts forbidding "mixed marriage" or sending children "beyond the seas" for schooling. Catholics were taxed at double the common rate, barred from the legal professions and from university, and not allowed to build churches or own a decent horse.

In 1793 the situation began to change, as it became clear that the economic persecution would not drive the majority away from Catholicism. Gradually, laws were repealed until by 1829 freedom was won, although Catholics at university were ineligible for honors, and until the 1920s when the Republic was formed, the Church of Ireland was the state church, funded by the taxes of all citizens.

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Fact of Faith

Exorcism

The Latin Church Bishops of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops approved the English translation of *De Exorcismis et Supplicationibus Quibusdam, editio typica* in November 2014. The final text of Exorcisms and Related Supplications (ERS) was confirmed by the Holy See in December 2016 and implemented in the dioceses of the United States as of June 29, 2017. In the course of the approval process, a list of frequently asked questions on exorcism and its use in the Church's liturgical life was developed by the Secretariat of Divine Worship. Answers were provided by specialists in this ministry and by experts in canon law.

Since so much of the common perception of the nature and application of exorcism is shaped by the exaggerations of movie scripts and television programs, the Committee on Divine Worship has approved dissemination of these basic questions and answers, in hopes that clear information is brought to bear on a topic that is often shrouded in mystery or misinformation.

What is an exorcism?

Exorcism is a specific form of prayer that the Church uses against the power of the devil.

What is the difference between an exorcism and the Sacrament of Penance?

Exorcism is a prayer that falls in the category of sacramentals, that is, one of a number of sacred signs instituted by the Church "to sanctify different circumstances of life" (Compendium of the Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 351), thus varying from the seven sacraments of the Church which were instituted by Christ himself. The Sacra-

ment of Penance forgives our sins and reconciles us to the Church, renewing Baptism and bestowing grace to fight evil and grow in virtue. As a sacramental, exorcism prepares one for the grace of the Sacrament.

Why does the Church need exorcisms?

There are instances when a person needs to be protected against the power of the devil or to be withdrawn from his spiritual dominion. At such times, the Church asks publicly and authoritatively in the name of Jesus Christ for this protection or liberation through the use of exorcism.

Is there a scriptural basis for exorcism?

While the basis for exorcism is grounded in the ministry of Jesus Christ (cf. Mk 1:34, 39; Lk 4:35; Mt 17:18), there is no scriptural basis for a formal rite of exorcism apart from the use of the psalms and Gospel pericopes that were included in the rite of exorcism as it evolved.

What is clear, however, is that the Lord Jesus involved the disciples in his mission and through their commissioning continued the exorcistic work begun by Jesus himself (cf. Mt 10:8; Mk 3:14-15; 6:13; 16:17; Lk 9:1; 10:17). It was not a work they did in their own names, but in the name of the One who had bestowed it upon them. Thus the ministry of exorcism continues in the life of the Church as part of the regular pastoral care of souls.

When and how is an afflicted member of the faithful referred to an exorcist?

It is advisable that every diocese establish a protocol to respond to inquiries made by the faithful who claim to be demonically afflicted. As part of the protocol, an assessment should occur to determine the true state of the person. Only after a thorough examination including medical, psychological, and psychiatric testing might the person be referred to the exorcist for a final determination regarding demonic possession. To be clear, the actual determination of whether a member of the faithful is genuinely possessed by the devil is made by the Church, even if individuals claim to be possessed through their own self-diagnosis or psychosis.

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Is the use of exorcism kept confidential?

For the integrity of the afflicted person's reputation as well as for those individuals who might be assisting, the preservation of confidentiality is important. It is also strongly suggested that the identity of the exorcist be kept secret or at most known only to the other priests of the diocese so as not to overwhelm the exorcist with random calls and inquiries.

May an exorcism be performed without the recipient's permission?

Given the nature of the devil's workings and the afflicted person's possible complicity in the resulting demonic possession, the exorcist should ascertain the person's consent if at all possible before proceeding with the Rite of Major Exorcism.

Are exorcisms the same everywhere, or are there regional and cultural differences?

The rites of exorcism are to be celebrated consistently following the directives (praenotanda) prescribed in the ritual. The rites are not to be altered at the discretion of the exorcist beyond the options clearly stated in the official text. However, before proceeding with the use of the rite, it is helpful for the exorcist to be aware of any cultural differences and regional influences that may have impacted the current state of the afflicted person. An evaluative instrument can assist in shedding light on such categories as: 1) the places where the person may have visited (healers, mediums, psychics); 2) the practices in which the person may have been involved (cleansings, New Age religion, Reiki); and 3) the ways that the person may have opened himself/herself directly to the dominion of the devil (magic, witchcraft, Satanic worship).

Gratitude: The Heart of Thanksgiving

In the United States, Thanksgiving Day is a holiday that is among the nation's finest national traditions. Indeed, setting a day aside for giving thanks to God is not just a U.S. phenomenon. Canadians have a Thanksgiving Day, and many countries worldwide celebrate harvest festivals that express gratitude to God. For Christian stewards, Thanksgiving Day has special meaning, for we know that gratitude lies at the very heart of stewardship.

A grateful heart heralds the beginning of discipleship and opens the way to our deepest response, the desire to return to God for the bounty of our lives. The French educator Jean Baptiste Massieu put it beautifully: "Gratitude is the memory of the heart." For what do we thank our Creator? The early American colonists, who gave inspiration to the Thanksgiving Day tradition, were thankful for their very survival in a harsh and unforgiving environment. Many of their compatriots were buried in the soil of their new land, far from all that had been cherished and familiar.

It's natural to thank God when things seem to turn out the way we had hoped, when disaster is averted, when life seems filled with abundance. Harder, perhaps, is the ability to thank God for being present to us in times of struggle, seeming failure, illness and death. But, in the heart of the Christian

steward, the memory of God's presence is a comfort and a gift all its own. If we take time to reflect on our lives, we often discover that that for which we are most grateful was a gift which we struggled to receive. What came to us in the form of hardship has in hindsight revealed itself as gift. This is why each day's struggles and trials should be met with a heartfelt "thank you."

Meister Eckhart, the 14th century Dominican mystic, wrote, "If the only prayer you ever say is 'thank you,' that will suffice." At first, this seems puzzling. What of praise and petition? But Eckhart knew that the most genuine response, and indeed, the first and most spontaneous response of the heart which has discovered God, is "thank you." Gratitude lies at the beginning of true prayer. As we reflect on this time of thanksgiving, let us be present to those moments when God's gifts were hidden in shadow and remember to be thankful for all.

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
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

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
