A Letter from Our Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

LITURGICAL ADAPTATIONS NEAR COMPLETION...

Last weekend I wrote about some of the liturgical adaptations that have been implemented here at SEAS. This past week we met with our Ushers. They are a small, but dedicated group of parishioners. In the olden days they were charged with only taking up the collection. Today we understand this ministry as that and so much more. They are often the first contact with our parish family when people join us for Mass. How they greet our visitors, first-timers, non-Catholics, curiosity seekers and even those of us who call this place our spiritual home, can have a significant impact. They are our first line of defense from the negativity of the secular world, and the loving and heartfelt welcome to all who enter our doors.

The first major adaptation you will all notice this weekend is that the ushers will no longer bring your collected contributions to the altar. The reason for this adaptation is only for security's sake. While there have been no present threats about someone planning to steal our weekend collections, I have always been uneasy with your generous support remaining out in the open under the altar until the end of Mass. Our ushers have been very diligent in securing our collections after Mass, and now I'm asking them to safely secure them immediately after the contributions have been collected. Therefore, the ushers will make sure they are safely deposited immediately after the weekend contributions are collected. In the event there is a second collection, that collection will be taken up separately AFTER the gifts of bread and wine are brought to the altar, and then safely secured.

The second adaptation will be at the presentation of the gifts of bread and wine. The deacon or the presiding priest (if there is no deacon) will now come to the base of the sanctuary to receive the gifts instead of waiting at the altar. This will open up the opportunity to bring up the gifts for those who may have a difficult time going up the sanctuary stairs.

THANKS FOR YOUR POSITIVE COMMENTS

Many of you have commented so favorably on these recent liturgical adaptations. Only a few

have questioned "why," but quickly realize the benefits of these adaptations and respond positively. It's true that one pastor may do it differently than another, and that's OK, as long as we're moving within the directives of liturgical practice. I think we could say the same about Fr. Bede and myself. We don't make changes for the sake of making changes, but to help maintain the dignity of the Eucharistic celebrations and implement some options we find useful from our experience. That's why it has taken me nearly four months to discern, consult, discuss, evaluate and move forward with these adaptations.

The adaptations, however, will only succeed with the consistent implementation by ALL of our liturgical ministers. I want to thank ALL of our liturgical ministers who attended these update sessions. For those who were not able to do so, you will be contacted with a "make-up" date to attend so that we're all on the same page. It's not just about learning **what** the adaptations are, but understanding **why** they are being implemented as well. I'm sure there will be some "growing pains" as we move forward, but the end result is greater uniformity in what we do when we gather together as one family united in the love of God.



Life is Hard, But Have No Fear

Today's readings take a fearless look at reality and reach a conclusion that we all know: life is hard. The prophet Malachi preaches fire and brimstone, warning us that evildoers will perish in flames. Saint Paul offers his own warning to the Thessalonians: keep busy, but never become a busybody. He reminds Christians that the apostles themselves worked in "toil and drudgery" as a model for how we ought to contribute to our community. The Gospel returns to the apocalyptic tone of Malachi, describing the utter chaos of the endtimes. We will know the end is near when violence, catastrophe, and hatred dominate the earth. But we must not fear! God's saving plan brings peace to our hearts. Malachi speaks of the sun's "healing rays," and Jesus himself promises to protect every hair on our heads.



Saint of the Week

Rose Philippine Duchesne 1769 - 1852 Feast Day - November 18

Growing up in a prosperous French family, Philippine joined the Visitation nuns, but returned to her family during the French Revolution. In 1804 she entered the Society of the Sacred Heart. After

much preparation, she led a missionary journey to Missouri in 1818. She set up the first free school west of the Mississippi, Sacred Heart houses and Novitiate, and a school for Indians. Despite frontier hardships and ill health, she persevered in her early dream of serving Native Americans.

Getting Married Catholic

The Catholic Church has a long history of helping couples to prepare for marriage. It has learned a great deal that can benefit any couple, regardless of religion.

Because the Catholic Church wants couples to form strong, lasting marriages, couples who wish to marry in the Catholic Church are asked to:

- Contact and meet with your parish priest as soon as you are engaged.
- Take at least six months to intensively prepare for your marriage. This goes beyond choosing a date and church, reserving a place for the reception, and picking out dresses. It means using this time to delve more deeply into your relationship and approach this momentous day with prayer and reflection.
- Attend an approved marriage preparation program. There are many different formats for marriage preparation programs ranging from intensive weekends, to a weekly series, to "in home" mentor couple programs. To find what programs are available near you, contact your diocesan family life office. Catholic marriage preparation programs are usually presented by a team of lay married couples and a priest or deacon. They are not restricted to Catholics, but they are always in keeping with Church teaching.
- Most dioceses ask couples to take a marriage preparation inventory (such as FO CCUS, PMI, or PREPARE). These are not "tests" to determine whether you can get married in the Church, but rather discussion starters to as-

sess what issues you already agree on and what you might need to discuss further.

Most importantly at the time of your engagement, the Church welcomes you to this sacrament of Marriage in the spirit of Jesus who said: This is my commandment: love one another as I love you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. (John 15:12-13)

Treasures from Our Tradition

We are faced with strong and disturbing readings today that hold a certain fascination, since they seem at first glance to be blueprints for future inevitable wars and hardship. A fundamentalist interpretation focuses on this aspect. Yet we hear them at our Sunday celebration of the Eucharist, which infuses them with hope and optimism. Rather than dreading the future, today's liturgy assures us that God is with us in all of life's inevitable trials, and that we have a role in shaping the outcome of human history. Occasionally, some Christians have attempted to decode these readings for an exact measure of the world's end, but they have thus far been disappointed.

"Nothing lasts forever" is a lyric from a Broadway show. Stars fall from the sky, leaves wither and fall, mountains wash into the sea, human projects and governments totter and collapse with great regularity. Today's liturgy opposes this idea as incomplete, reminding us that Christ has made a permanent change in human history, and that life in him is life forever. Rather than inviting us to throw in the towel, today's liturgy strengthens us for acts of goodness and grace in our families, communities and world.


Popular Devotions

The faith of the Christian people has developed numerous forms of popular piety and devotions. The religious instincts of the Christian people have always found ways to surround sacramental life with helps to benefit more effectively from them. Popular devotions have proven to be powerful forms of prayer and to be of spiritual benefit to many.

These forms of piety include praying at the Stations of the Cross; making pilgrimages to the Holy Land, Rome, Marian shrines and shrines of other saints; lighting candles in church; having throats blessed on the feast of St. Blaise; joining in Corpus Christi processions; wearing medals of the Blessed Virgin and the saints; and honoring sacred relics. Some materials that form part of the Church's liturgical rites, such as the ashes received on Ash Wednesday and the palms distributed on Palm Sunday, are also sacramentals.

Devotions to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, the Divine Mercy of Jesus and the Blessed Mother are frequently part of parish life and often include a novena, nine days of prayer associated with the devotion. Prayer groups such as those sponsored by Charismatic Renewal, Cursillo, Marriage Encounter and Teens for Christ have both a strong liturgical foundation as well as a vibrant devotional component.

The praying of litanies (a series of invocations of the Blessed Mother or the saints) and the use of icons, holy pictures and statues as supports for prayer are also forms of popular devotion. The faithful do not worship pictures and statues; they venerate or honor the Virgin Mary and the saints

A Whole House Purge and Making Room for Jesus

A condensed excerpt from Live Big, Love Bigger, a new book by Kathryn Whitaker, published by Ave Maria Press.

Scrolling through Instagram one January, I stumbled upon my friend Stephanie's post about embarking on a ten-day whole house purge and deep clean. My ears perked up and I thought to myself, I was born for this! I assembled my boxes, gathered my cleaning supplies, and armed myself with paper towels and microfiber cloths.

The first week I tackled the kitchen, dining room, playroom, laundry room, and living area. Week two was bathrooms, master bedroom, entryway, office, and the kids' rooms, including closets. The kids told me I was nuts. The next few days we finished the whole house purge. Yes, the cobwebs were gone and my baseboards were sparkling, but it was my heart I set free. By freeing myself of the physical clutter, I had made room for Jesus where it mattered – my soul. I finally had the space to see him at work in my life.

The more you purge, the less you have to take care of and the more time you have to spend doing things with people you love. The added bonus? Following the purge, we became more intentional about what we brought into our home.

When we detach ourselves from the physical clutter, releasing ourselves to be open to the will of God, we are given an opportunity. The purge sparked gratitude for every aspect of our life. Over the kids' computer area, I hand-painted one of our favorite quotes: A grateful heart silences a complaining voice. It was a gold nugget of a quote from an annual stewardship conference my husband attends.

In a society that lauds us for accumulating more, doing more and being more, it's countercultural to hold up our hands in surrender and say, no more. Before the purge, I think I felt beholden – both consciously and unconsciously – to things. Perhaps it's time for you to do a whole-soul purge. It really is possible to remove the barriers to a true and lasting relationship with God, to scrub clean our doubts, to feel worthy of love and to seek joy. A life of order is a good and holy endeavor. Just be careful about responding to a challenge on Instagram. You may come armed with trash bags, magic solution and microfiber cloths, and walk away with a lighter heart, a happier home and a joy-filled relationship with Christ.




A Stewardship Moment

In the Philippines, Simbang Gabi (Night Mass) is a devotional nine-day series of Masses (novena) celebrated in the morning, 4-5am or in the evening, 6-7pm. It is also called "Misa de Gallo" (Mass when the cock crows) or "Misa de Aguinaldo." Families wake up early, attend Mass and fill many churches. After the liturgy, delicious Filipino food and delicacies are served and shared by families. This novena becomes both a religious and social gathering.

In the Las Vegas valley, Simbang Gabi is celebrated in different parishes at their regular Mass times, as published in parish bulletins. Parishioners are invited to attend and participate in the novena. The pastor/associate at the assigned parish may preside at the liturgy. Visiting priests may be welcome to concelebrate. The readings of the day are proclaimed, and a simple reception takes place after the Mass.


