

Parents and Godparents should attend the baptism class on the first Tuesday of the month at 6:30 pm in the Parish Hall classrooms. Adults are baptized at the Easter Vigil after completing the stages of the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA).

In addition, it was great to see the whole parish family not only taking part in the festivities, but actively involved in volunteering and making it all happen as well!

Being my first **Boo Bash and International Food Festival** as your pastor, I look forward to our entire family coming together to enjoy each other and to raise some much needed funds for our parish family's school. It'll be another new experience for me as I keep on learning about the various events that keep this parish family hopping.

I'm sure many of you know how it feels when you throw a family party and someone doesn't show up. It's kind of a "downer." From what I experienced at last year's very successful **Boo Bash**, I'm hoping that even more of our family will come out and make it another grand success! In addition to the many volunteers who will be working behind the scenes, this year we'll be entertained with music from our very own parishioners Ray & Mandi Kowalski from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., and by Patty Janura and Brian Hicks as the Patty Janura Band provides some great entertainment beginning at 5:30 p.m.! Both of these acts perform regularly on the Las Vegas strip. It will be nice not to have to travel down to the strip late at night to hear them! We all should take advantage of that! So, will you be there?

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN STILL LIVES ON!

With our very successful Commitment Weekend on September 21st and 22nd, we were able to cross-over the half-way point as we pledged an additional \$400,000 toward our goal of \$4.5 million! Isn't that amazing what we were able to accomplish in one weekend?! The net was "cast out to the deep" and we caught a lot of fish-pledges of different sizes ranging from promised prayers to \$10 to \$15,000! And each and every pledge was

equally important. It's not about equal gifts, but equal sacrifice!

As we enter the "redemption phase" (where we begin to see many pledges being fulfilled), I'd like to remind everyone that we're not finished with the campaign. While we're now at a participation rate of 23% of our parish family, we still have 77% who have yet to join the rest of the family and help us reach our goal. There are still many parishioners who, during the planning phase, said they would participate but still have not. There's still about \$565,000 in promised pledges from the planning study that never came through. My hope is that those who promised to participate will be able to fulfill their promises and help us move forward to a future full of hope!



Healing and Salvation

The readings today speak of healing and salvation. In Second Kings, Naaman, a commander of the army of the king of Syria, develops leprosy. He goes to a stranger, a prophet from Israel, when no one else can cure his disease. Much to his surprise, after a simple bath in the river, he is cured. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus cures ten lepers and sends them to the priest. Only one, a Samaritan, returns to thank Jesus for his cure and only he hears the words, "Your faith has saved you." The psalm and Timothy remind us that salvation involves justice, kindness, and faithfulness and forever links us with Jesus. In a world as broken as ours, both healing and salvation are necessary.

Treasures From Our Tradition

Christian liturgy has always contained an opportunity to make a choice for sharing. From the beginning, Christians pooled their resources, especially for the care of widows and orphans, at the weekly Eucharist. Over the years, the collection became detached from the liturgy and baskets or plates would be passed through the community while the Mass was going on at the altar, or contributions would be collected at the doors. In Milan's Ambrosian Rite, these gifts have always been brought to the altar by lay people in procession. In German countries, the ancient custom was for the entire assembly to process with their gifts—first the men, then the women, then the priests and deacons—to offer their gifts at the altar. The old ceremony of canonization included a curious vestige of this procession: people would present the pope with two loaves of bread, two barrels of wine and water, five candles, and three cages containing pigeons or turtledoves!

Saint of the Week

Saint Isaac Jogues 1607 - 1646 Feast Day - Oct. 19

Born in Orleans, France, Isaac joined the Jesuits at a

young age and was sent to his order's North American mission in 1636. He and Rene Goupil were captured and tortured by a band of Iroquois in 1642. Rene was killed and Isaac was held as a slave until his rescue by Dutch settlers. He returned to France, secured permission to continue saying Mass despite mutilated hands, and returned to Canada in 1644. He and John Lalande were tomahawked and beheaded by Huron Indians who invited them to a meal. These three and five others, the North American martyrs, are patron saints of Canada and North America. They share this feast and shrines in New York State and Ontario, Canada.

Respect Life Reflection

Christ Our Hope: In Every Season of Life

From the time we are knit together in our mothers' wombs until we take our final breaths, each moment of our lives is a gift from God. While every season of life brings its own challenges and trials, each season also gives us new opportunities to grow in our relationship with God.

Today the gift of life is threatened in countless ways. Those who are most vulnerable, rather than receiving the protection they deserve, are all too often seen as a burden and as expendable. As new attacks on human life continue to emerge, we can be tempted to despair, but Christ instead offers us unfailing hope.

Hope is not false optimism or empty positivity. Christian hope is something much more profound and goes to the very depths of our identity as followers of Christ.

Hope is the virtue "by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit" (CCC, 1817).

Like us, Christ entered the world through the womb of a woman. He willingly experienced the fullness of human suffering. He breathed his last on the Cross at Calvary in order that He might save us. Therefore, "God is the foundation of hope: not any god, but the God who has a human face and who has loved us to the end" (*Spe salvi* 31).

Christians know "they have a future: it is not that

they know the details of what awaits them, but they know in general terms that their life will not end in emptiness" (SS 2).

For this reason, a woman experiencing a difficult pregnancy can find the strength to welcome her precious child into the world. A man facing a terminal diagnosis can see that the end of his earthly life is only the beginning of eternal life with Christ.

The Church teaches us that "the one who has hope lives differently" (SS 2). Christ's promise of salvation does not mean that we will be spared from suffering. Rather, the promise of salvation ensures that even in the darkest moments of our lives, we will be given the strength to persevere. By virtue of this Christian hope, we can face any challenge or trial. When the seas of life swell and we are battered by the waves, hope allows us to remain anchored in the heart of God. May we hold fast to Christ our hope, from the beginning of life to its very end.

Living the Faith

Three Ways to Pray

This blog post was written by Stacey Noem and is part of the series "Happily Even After."

I love the Jesuits! Actually, that is fairly imprecise...I have had very little direct

formation from Jesuits. More accurately I should say: I love Ignatian spirituality!

As I mentioned a few months ago, we had a pretty busy summer (see "Big Fish"). One of our big projects was assisting the Jesuit Volunteer Corps in rewriting their domestic Orientation program for new volunteers. It was a fairly intense process, but also very fruitful. The greatest personal fruit for me was

getting to immerse myself more deeply in Ignatian spirituality.

[Quick cliff notes background: St. Ignatius of Loyola, the founder of the Society of Jesus (Jesuits), developed the well-known Spiritual Exercises. What I love about Ignatian spirituality is how it offers some clear structure to prayer. A priest friend of mine observed that in ministry we often tell people they need to pray. However, we infrequently TEACH them how to pray. This was not the case with Ignatius. He was very clear on how he encouraged his brothers in the Society to pray.

Here are some of the Ignatian practices Josh and I have found particularly useful in our family life of prayer:

The Examen – This is not the same thing as an "examination of conscience" one might do prior to confession. Rather it is a roughly five-step process to review the content of the day. It moves through stages of looking for moments of gratitude; to reviewing the events of the day; to calling to mind anything we regret or are sorry for; to deciding if we need to reconcile with anyone; to asking God to be present and give us the grace necessary for the next day.

I have heard the Examen described as "inviting God into our story" – consciously looking for God's presence in the moments of the day and paying attention to them in a particular way. Joshua and I sometimes pray the Examen together after the children have gone to bed. One of us cues the stages of the reflections and then we share the fruit of our individual prayer with one another at the end.

Consolations and Desolations – We believe in a fundamentally incarnate God. The Jesuits further their awareness of this reality by "finding God in all things." One way to do this is through identifying consolations and desolations. A consolation is any experience in which we feel consoled by God's presence. These would be moments in the day when we feel particularly peaceful, joy-filled, hopeful, loving. A desolation is an experience in which

we feel distanced from God. These would be moments of confusion, fear, or loneliness. Consolations and desolations are not as simple as saying when you were happy and sad in a day—this is a deeper reflection than that. These are the times that we felt closest to God and farthest from God.

Josh and I have been doing this exercise with the children for years. When Oscar was about five we started doing it as part of our family night prayer. However, we discontinued it there when Simon and Lucy came along, as they were too little to contribute to or really appreciate it. Then a few years ago we revived it at the dinner table as part of our family conversation. The practice helps us re-enter one another's day and hold our experiences in common.

Imaginative Contemplation – This is a method of praying with Scripture in which we use our imagination to enter into the passage. Most often it is prayed with a Gospel passage that moves us toward an encounter with Jesus. In preparation we read the passage once or twice. Then, often with eyes closed, we use our senses to begin to enter into the scene described in the passage: what it must have sounded like, smelled like, felt like; what the people look like, wear, and how they sound; where we feel drawn to stand or sit, and how we participate in or observe the scene unfold before us...all leading up to a personal conversation with Jesus.

Contrastingly to the Examen where we "invite God into our story," I have heard imaginative contemplation described as "entering into God's story." I am deeply drawn to prayer with Scripture and would like for our family to do more of it together now that the children are getting older. I have introduced this prayer exercise into our Sunday night family prayer using the Gospel passage from that day's Mass. So far it has met with varying amounts of success. The children are not yet familiar enough with the process to enter into it easily. But I know that this is not a reason to give it up as much as be gentle with them as we slowly incorporate it into our routine.

It is often quoted that the "family that prays together, stays together.." Our hope is that in sharing a bit of the wealth of the deep Catholic Tradition of prayer, our children might discover the ways they communicate most easily with God.

Reflection

Managing Technology and Your Family

When I reminisce about special family times, the joy and simplicity of our adventures in God's great outdoors are some of my best memories. The times that we talked, laughed, shared and played were much simpler times, without some of the challenges that today's parents are facing. No one had cell phones or smart phones. We were happily unavailable to the outside world, and I believe that this deepened our presence to one another, and strengthened our family.

I have no issue with technology itself, but I cannot deny that I have seen its detrimental effect on families. The other day, as I passed the playground, I saw a child playing as his mother sat off to the side engaged in her smart phone. It made me sad to think that when that child did something wonder-ful and sought the eye contact of his mother to see if she had seen him, that special moment would not happen for him. His mother was physically present, but absent to him in spirit.

We all need "down time" as adults, but it seems that we need to return to the idea of being fully present to those around us and not miss those opportunities that come so fleetingly, at times.

There are opportunities every day to indicate through eye contact or gesture that we notice and care for one another. If your attention is on a screen, how can you know who around you is in need? These "small misses" will eventually add up and lessen the quality of our relationships. Though we are more globally connected, it seems we are becoming more distant to one another. Our pow-

ers of observation have been diminished by our need to "multi-task."

Grace is subtle, and if we are missing opportunities to connect with others in a deeper way, are we not also becoming oblivious to God's actions in ourselves and others?

So what is a family to do? When our children were small, we used to teach them a simple phrase for deciding whether to do something: "Is it helpful, or hurtful?" As heads and hearts of families, parents must do the same.

As parents, we must discern through prayer the place that technology holds in our lives and draw firm boundaries as to its reach into our homes. This involves a deep examination of ourselves, and a humble openness to what God is calling us to become in relationship to those around us. The health of our households depends on how intentional we are as parents in defining the culture within the walls of our home.

We must cultivate the sensitivity that tells us, "This is too much," or tells us when to decline something due to its addictive nature. Just as we can fast from food, new possibilities can arise in our lives because we abstained from a form of technology that would consume too much of our time.

Like you, it is an on-going discernment for Dennis and me, even with our children now grown up. With the rapidly changing advances in technology, we need to decide what will help us and what may detract from the sweetness and joy of the life God calls us to.

Let's go to God and ask Him how best to use our time, how best to feel fully alive. Chances are the answer does not involve much technology.

Stewards of a Missionary Church

Jesus said to his apostles, "Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). The month of October is an ideal time to focus our prayers on the world and to reflect on how we might follow Christ's call to proclaim his teachings to "the whole world." The people of the world are a gift from God and this global community is a gift to be received with gratitude and held in stewardship.

world.

There are a number of ways you can focus on the missionary activity of the Church:

- Include petitions for the Church's missionary work in your daily prayers.
- Increase your awareness of the wider global mission of the Church.
- Discover ways to participate in specific missionary activities taking place in your diocese.
- Give generously on World Mission Sunday, celebrated this year on October 20.

The Church's work around the world is as important as the work in our own neighborhood. Let us be mindful this month that we are stewards of the Gospel, called to proclaim it to the ends of the earth, bringing hope to a world that is desperately hungry for Christ's loving presence.


A Stewardship Moment




