

REMEMBER HOLY WEEK OF 2020?

It was Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion which began on April 5th, 2020, and opened up the most surreal Holy Week of my then 58 years of life (now I'm a young 63!). All of our Roman Catholic Churches were on lock-down due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Here at SEAS we decided to live-stream all of our regularly scheduled Masses so everyone could pray in the security of their own homes in the times they would ordinarily be at Church. While no one could come to Mass in our worship space, we were united in a special bond thanks to the use of live-streaming technology. During those days I owed a deep debt of gratitude to Fr. Bede for having installed that technology during his ministry as pastor here. Thanks, Fr. Bede!

Even though those dark times were just five years ago, I hope all of us would have a renewed sense of appreciation for what we now have at the beginning of this Holy Week 2025:

- Our attendance at Mass has returned to pre-pandemic numbers, and has even grown as well! The vitality of our community worship at Mass finds visitors inspired by how well our parish family actively participates at Mass in both sung and spoken words, thanks to our vibrant musical, liturgical and sacred environment ministries! Our parish membership has stepped up to the plate and continues to increase their commitment to Christian stewardship with their time, talent and treasure!
- And then there's all the other ministries that flourish from our faith formation programs for youth and adults (young-andnot-so-young), our Human Concerns Ministries for those in need, and the varied parish affiliated and non-affiliated organizations.

Seven Churches Pilgrimage, Explained

The Seven Churches Pilgrimage is the practice of visiting seven different churches on Holy Thursday, in imitation of the journey of Christ on the eve of his crucifixion.

The devotion is thought to have originated in sixteenth-century Rome, where pilgrims — likely led by St. Philip Neri — would visit the seven major basilicas there: St. Peter's in the Vatican, St. John Lateran, St. Paul Outside the Walls, St. Mary Major, St. Sebastian Outside the Walls, St. Lawrence Outside the Walls, and Santa Croce in Gerusalemme.

Pilgrims undertaking this journey anywhere in the world can visit any seven churches while adoring Christ in the Blessed Sacrament upon the Altar of Repose, fulfilling his request of his disciples to stay with him as he awaited his Passion. There are specific Scripture passages that pilgrims can meditate upon at each altar.

LITURGY GOSPEL MEDITATION

Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

"As he rode along, the people were spreading their cloaks on the road." (Luke 19:36)

Consider how useless it is to spread your clothes on the ground for a donkey to walk on. The clothes get smeared with hooves, and who knows the grimy places where they've been? The animal may leave some unsavory presents on them. They may get stolen by a thief looking to make a buck. The thorns, thistles, rocks and muck of the road will leave stains. The clothes may never be useful again, and you'll probably walk home shivering without your normal covering. Yet this is precisely the gesture the people employ to welcome Jesus and his donkey. Why does this detail matter?

Wastefulness is an essential part of celebration. Consider the unnecessary extravagance of Christmas decorations, confetti and ticker tape parades, baseball players spraying each other with bottles of champagne after a victory, birthday gifts for kids and so on. This wastefulness signals celebration and therefore participation in higher identities (as believers, winners, and parents, to mention the above examples). That's what the wasted cloaks are all about. Those who donate their cloaks participate in Christ's kingship in Jerusalem — and we savor it two thousand years later.

The lesson? Learn how to "waste" money, time, clothes, and food on Christ. We do this at Mass, but in so many other ways, too, like serving the poor, going on retreats, and doing prayerful study. When we practice this holy wastefulness, Jesus will ride into our lives and we'll be more deeply members of his kingdom.

First Reading: Isaiah bears witness as one who did not lose his faith despite persecution and ridicule. Can you discuss a time when your faith was put to the test?

Second Reading: Paul teaches the Philippians that Jesus was humble and obedient to God even to the point of death by crucifixion. Why do you think humility and obedience are important virtues in following Jesus?

Gospel: In his passion narrative, Luke is the only evangelist to highlight that both Pilate and Herod (Antipas) find Jesus innocent of the charges against him. Is there a friend or co-worker you could help this week who is being treated unfairly?

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Question: Where do Palm Sunday palms come from and where should they go?

Answer: The Palm Sunday celebration has ancient origins. Beginning the liturgy "outside" the church, we symbolically reenact Christ's entry into Jerusalem. The crowds in ancient Israel waved palm branches – a symbol of royalty – to welcome Jesus. These days, obtaining palms takes a lot of planning and coordination, as hundreds of thousands of churches worldwide need them on the same day! Many in the United States order palms from Florida, California, Texas, or Central America. Many companies stress the sustainability of their production and the just wages paid to their workers.

The palms used on Palm Sunday are blessed at Mass. This means they shouldn't end up in the trash! Many people weave palms into crosses or families display them in their homes. If you do not plan on displaying your palms throughout the year, they should be burned or buried. ©LPi

PRACTICING CATHOLIC

The Stones Will Cry Out

I have a complicated relationship with evangelization. I don't think that we (I'm talking about 21st-century American Catholics here) have had much formation around what exactly it means to proclaim the Gospel. We don't know how to do it. We don't really want to do it. It sounds kind of scary and awkward. It sounds like knocking on strangers' doors and yelling through the keyhole, "Have you accepted Christ as your Lord and Savior?" It sounds like arguing with friends and family. It sounds like a real pain.

I'm Catholic. I'm proud of being Catholic. I do my Catholic things in my Catholic house throughout my Catholic life. But is that enough? All Christians are called to "wordless witness" in how they live their lives, writes Paul VI in the apostolic exhortation Evangelii Nuntiandi — but this alone, he says, is "insufficient." We must talk about Jesus. We must name him. We must speak of his life, his promises. We must proclaim him. We must be loud enough that a Pharisee would cringe at us. And yet — and Paul VI acknowledges this it's not actually evangelization if we do it so badly that nobody listens. If we "impose" truth on someone's conscience instead of "proposing" it. If we make the mistake of thinking there is one singular way to share Christ with the great variety of personalities that exist in this world.

Dear reader, I am running out of column space, and still I have no answers for you, or for myself. I don't know how to do it well. But I know we have to try. We have to pray. We have to reflect. We have to be patient. We have to be humble. We have to remember it's about him and not about us. Most of all, when we find ourselves confused and retreating into silence, we must remember Christ's words: "If they keep silent, the stones will cry out."

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A Letter from Archbishop Thomas Regarding the Good Friday Collection

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

On Good Friday, April 18, 2025, our Archdiocese will take up the national collection for the Holy Land.

Christians in the Holy Land face special challenges - many of which we hear about in the daily news. The war is leaving deep wounds that will take time to heal. Many Christians (for example, 90% in Bethlehem) depend on the pilgrimage industry to live. They could not work during the pandemic, and the war has stopped the flow of pilgrims into the Holy Land. Once pilgrims return, it will take time before our Christians can recover from years of loss. Supporting the Collection offers hope to the Holy Land Christians.

Please be generous in your support of this collection. Holy Land Christians, along with the Clergy and Religious working there, greatly depend on our generosity.

Fasting & Abstaining from Meat During Holy Week

Fasting

In the dioceses in the United States, Catholics aged 18 through 59 are bound to fast on Good Friday (April 18). To fast means to consume one full meal a day at most, although taking of other, smaller quantities of food at the other customary mealtimes is permitted. Food and drink between meals (excepting water and medicine) is not permitted on fast days.

Abstinence from Meat

Catholics aged 14 and up are to abstain from meat on Good Friday. To abstain means refraining from eating beef, veal, pork or poultry at least, although eggs and milk products are acceptable. The consumption of fish and shellfish is permitted, though the penitential character of the abstinence should be kept in mind.

Excused from Fasting and Abstinence from Meat

Those who are excused from fast and abstinence outside the age limits include the physically or mentally ill including individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also excluded are pregnant or nursing women. In all cases, common sense should prevail, and ill persons should not further jeopardize their health by fasting.

Divine Mercy Devotion — April 27

Join us at 2 p.m. on Sunday, April 27, to pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet. The message and devotion to Jesus as The Divine Mercy is based on the writings of Saint Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun, who, in obedience to her spiritual director, wrote a diary of about 600 pages recording the revelations she received about God's mercy. Even before her death in 1938, the devotion to The Divine Mercy had begun to spread. The message of mercy is that God loves us — all of us — no matter how great our sins. He wants us to recognize that his mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon him with trust, receive his mercy, and let it flow through us to others.



THE SACRED PASCHAL TRIDUUM OR "THREE DAYS"

What we do at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton from Holy Thursday to Easter Sunday

Holy Thursday brings Lent to an end with the celebration of The Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper, which is actually the vigil of Good Friday. That night we begin the "Triduum" (pronounced "TRID-oo-um") or "Three Days" that are the center of our entire year. Why are these Three Days so important? What do they mean for you? Read on! You are invited to make the Sacred Paschal Triduum different from all the rest of the days of the year.

Whether you are young or old, currently active in our parish or not, please set these days aside. All of us should know that our presence for the liturgies of the Sacred Paschal Triduum is not just by invitation. These days are an honor and a privilege to come together in thanksgiving for all Christ has done for us.

THREE DAYS, BUT ONE CONTINUOUS LITURGY

On these Three Days we gather a number of times during the evening or day to celebrate **one complete liturgy**. We begin with the sign of the cross on Holy Thursday and end with the dismissal at the end of the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night or on the Masses of Easter Sunday. Together we hear some of the church's most beautiful prayers and scriptures and we make some of our finest music. Please look closely at our schedule below and make plans to take part in the various liturgies of Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday. Above all, come on Saturday night for the The Easter Vigil in the Holy Night when we welcome the new members to our Roman Catholic community! Remember, the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night fulfills your Easter Sunday obligation!

WE BEGIN ON HOLY THURSDAY...

HOLY THURSDAY • April 17, 2025

The Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper7:00 PM

Adoration in the Parish Hall until Midnight Prayer

Lent officially ends as the Sacred Triduum begins on Holy Thursday with *The Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper*. On this Thursday evening, which is actually the vigil of Good Friday, we enter into this Sacred Triduum together. After listening to the scriptures, we do something strange: We wash feet. In our name and as our example, our Presider goes down on his knees and washes the feet of several parishioners. Jesus gave us this image of what the church is supposed to look like, feel like, act like. This is rehearsal for all of Christian life.

Afterward, we celebrate the Eucharist, which is the ultimate gift of Christ's real presence sustaining us on

our earthly journeys. The evening liturgy has no ending. We process with the Blessed Sacrament to the altar of repose in our Parish Hall. Whether we stay to pray awhile or leave, we have now entered in the quiet and peace and solemnity of the Sacred Triduum.

GOOD FRIDAY • April 18, 2025

The Celebration of the Lord's Passion (with Communion)12:00 PM

The Celebration of the Lord's Passion (with Communion)3:00 PM

We gather quietly at 12:00 Noon (the traditional time of the crucifixion) **or** 3:00PM (the traditional time of the death of Christ) on Good Friday for *The Celebration of the Lord's Passion*. We listen to scripture. We pray at length for all the world's needs. Then there is another once-a-year event: The holy cross is held up in our midst and we adore together as a faith community. Then we receive our Lord in the Eucharist to sustain us until the Easter Vigil in the Holy Night on Holy Saturday. When the service is ended, individuals may come forward one by one to adore the cross on which our savior died. This service is the official continuation of the one Sacred Triduum.

A Tenebrae Service is an ancient time of prayer offered in the evening. While not an official part of the Sacred Paschal Triduum liturgies and without Holy Communion, this service symbolizes what appears to be the temporary triumph of the Prince of Darkness over the Light of the World as we pray with various characters of scripture. The service ends in darkness and with a loud noise made by everyone symbolizing the death of Jesus. At the end, a small amount of light appears as we leave in silence and await the glorious resurrection of Christ.
